

METHODS OF FILLING SILOS

Careful Tramping and Leveling, Together With Other Essential Features, Are Important.

Haphazard methods of filling silos have spoiled many thousand tons of good corn and often given silage a "black eye." Careful tramping and leveling, together with other essential features in filling the silo are important.

Corn makes the best silage when the majority of the ears are dented, or just beginning to glaze. If corn is put into the silo before this stage of maturity is reached, the silage becomes very sour or acid, and is apt to have a low feeding value.

When corn becomes dry from being frosted or allowed to get ripe, it will make good silage if water is added at filling time. No definite rule can be given as to the right amount of water to add, but the aim should be to make the moisture content equal to that of green corn.

It is very essential that the cut corn be thoroughly mixed after it is elevated or blown into the silo. If this is not done, the heavier portions will fall in one place and cause the silage to settle unevenly, resulting in much loss, due to spoiling.

During the process of filling, the cut material should be kept slightly higher at the edges than in the center, and well tramped close to the sides where friction prevents it from settling. It is not necessary to tramp in the center of the silo, for the weight of the silage there is sufficient to insure thorough packing. Silos that are deep and of large diameter require less tramping than those of smaller dimensions.

SOME LITTLE PIG TROUBLES

Do Not Feed Dirty, Spoiled or Sour Feed—Good Remedy for Rickets—Isolate Sick Hogs.

If your little pigs are troubled with scours change the diet of the sow. Do not feed dirty, spoiled or sour feed. Thoroughly cook all meat scraps.

If hard, bony enlargements form on the hock joints of your small pigs, the chances are that they have rickets. Introduce some new blood into the herd and feed your pigs per each 100 pounds weight a mixture of calcium phosphate pulverized, nux vomica two ounces, artificial carlsbad salts ten ounces.

For worms give five grains calomel and ten grains santonin per each 100 pounds, followed in about six hours by a bran mash, or give ten grains santonin and 20 grains area nut after a 24-hour fast.

Follow some of your hogs to the packing house and see them inspected. It will pay in case they are tubercular. Use plenty of whitewash around the pens.

Isolate all sick hogs. Burn all dead ones.

CARING FOR FLOCK OF DUCKS


Fowls Do Better if Given Same Ration Every Day—Change Is Likely to Stop Egg Yield.

Handle ducks by the neck—never carry them by the legs.

If a duck breaks down in driving to pasture, mark it for the butcher; we want vigor in the breeding stock.

Ducks may be housed for laying early in October. Do not put over 20 ducks in a pen together; they pile up at feeding time, or if scared, and are apt to get injured in a large flock.

A duck fed for eggs in October should lay in six weeks. A good feed is made by taking equal parts of corn-

meal and bran, and two parts of low-grade flour with five parts of cut clover or clover chaff. Ducks do better if fed the same ration every day; a change of food usually stops the egg yield.

When feeding beef scraps to ducks, soak them over night, and then mix with the grain and clover mash.

Eradicate Canada Thistles. Canada thistles in small patches may be killed by covering the ground with tar paper or other heavy building paper, overlapping the edges so that no plants can reach the air and sunlight. The paper may be weighted down with earth, stones, or fence rails.

Good Time to Spray Cows. At milking time it is easy to spray the cows. Then they will stand without any trouble, and the milking can be done with some satisfaction.

Treasurer's Notice.

The County Treasurer's office will be open for the purpose of receiving taxes from the 15th day of October 1914 to the 15th day of March 1915. All taxes shall be due and payable between the 15th day of October, 1914, and December 31st, 1914. That when taxes charged shall not be paid by December 31st, 1914, the County Auditor shall proceed to add a penalty of one per cent for January, and if taxes are not paid on or before February 1st, 1915, the County Auditor will proceed to add two per cent, and five per cent from the 1st of March to the 15th of March, after which time all unpaid taxes will be collected by the Sheriff.

The law prescribes that all male citizens between the ages of 18 and 55 years must pay \$2 commutation tax or work six days on the public roads.
