District Meeting of Junior Order.

A district meeting of the Junior Order was held in Edgefield Saturday night. There were about 80 persons in attendance, 25 of whom were visiting delegates. Appropriate welcome addresses were made by Hon. J. O. Sheppard in behalf of the Junior Order and by Mayor J. G. Edwards in behalf of the town. The response was made by Mr. G. L. Toole of Aiken. The meeting was presided over by District Deputy Rhoden of Bath.

The occasion was one of much real profit as well as a very pleasant one. One matter acted upon was the adoption of a resolution calling upon the State convention to be held in Abbeville later to provide for the election of a legislative committee to look after the enactment of such legislation as the members of the order feel should be passed. As the conclusion of the business session the social hour that followed was a pleasant feature, giving the members of the Edgefield lodge an opportunity to meet and mingle with the visiting delegates. Under the direction of Mr. J. W. Reese refreshments were served, this being a very important feature of the occasion.

Examination for Post Office.

Pursuant to the announcement published some time ago, Mr. Holley, an employee of the Aiken post office, held an examination in the Court House Saturday looking to filling the vacancy in the Edgefield post office caused by the term of Mr. C. M. Mellichamp having expired. Those who stood the examination were Mrs. W. R. Swearingen, Miss Sophie Mims, Mrs. W. S. G. Heath, Miss Fannie Timmerman, Mr. W. L. Dunovant, Jr., Mr. T. A. Owdom, Mr. Watson Ouzts, Mr. C. M. Mellichamp and Mr. J. G. Holland. According to rules governing Civil Service appointments, should the appointment be made on merit and fitness, one of the three making the highest mark on the examination will be chosen for the Edgefield post office. The statement has been made in the public print, even charged on the floor of the senate, we believe, that the Republican party is ignoring this Civil Service rule in some instances in making appointments. However, it will soon be shown whether this be true or not, as the appointment will be made at an early date.

Notice to Democratic Clubs of Edgefield County.

As provided under Rule 5 of the Democratic party of South Carolina, the Democratic clubs of Edgefield county are required to meet on April 22, the fourth Saturday, for the purpose of reorganizing and electing delegates to the county convention to be held at Edgefield the 1st Monday in May.

They shall elect a president, one or more vice-presidents, secretary, and treasurer, an executive committeeman, one delegate to the county convention for each 25 members and one delegate for a majority fraction thereof based upon the number of votes polled by the club in the first primary of 1920. In addition to the foregoing, each club should elect a committee on enrollment or registration, an executive committee and such other committees as each club may deem expedient.

The members of all clubs are urged to meet, reorganize and elect officers and delegates as required under the rules of the party.

Clubs will please forward as early as possible after re-organizing a complete list of their officers and delegates to the undersigned.
