

WASHINGTON, April 3. Both Houses were engaged on Friday on the private calendar. The Senate all day debated one bill. The House passed more bills and dispatched more business than any day during the session. Both Houses adjourned over until Monday.

To-day has been quite and still in the city, and members appear to enjoy the holiday remarkably well, their labors having been very arduous for several weeks; and besides, the country will not object to adjournments over, because when Congress is not in session, the country is safe. Too much legislation is the tendency and bane of all republican governments.

The presidential struggle is growing in interest and confusion. The Northern Whigs, who favor the views of Seward, seem determined to make Gen. Scott the Whig nominee; and it is now reduced to a certainty that the Southern Whigs will promptly refuse to support him, unless he comes out unequivocally in favor of the faithful execution of the fugitive slave law as it is. It is now supposed he will make no written pledges, lest he should drive the Free Soilers of the North. Some of the Northern politicians have become emboldened by numbers, and declare they will nominate Scott, and elect him by a unanimous Northern vote.

It is not nominated without pledges, the Southern Whigs will write with a few Fillmore Whigs and run an independent ticket. If Scott is nominated with pledges to carry out the Compromise measures, the Whig and Democratic Free Soilers will make a nomination, and support their own man.

The Democrats are in equal confusion. If the candidate nominated is not acceptable to the States, the Whigs of the South, they will run an independent ticket. Many of the States or Southern Rights men are of opinion that their friends should not be represented at all in the Convention, and thereby be left free to accept or reject the nominee. They are of opinion, and very justly so, that by keeping themselves independent of the organization, that their wishes will be more certainly consulted by the nominating Convention; and this is the more apparent when it is remembered, that by going in, they place themselves in a position to be absorbed by the National Democracy, indirectly pledging themselves to the nomination, whether acceptable or not.

Your State has never gone into the Madisonian Convention, and it would be a most important time now to change her long established policy, when the chances are so great that three or four candidates may be in the field for the presidency. I would not be surprised in the least, if the Electoral College failed to make a choice, and that the election would devolve upon the States, through the House of Representatives. If so, the candidate receiving the votes of the South in the Electoral College, will doubtless be elected.

SALARY TO MEMBERS OF CONGRESS.—A bill has been introduced into Congress by Mr. Fayette McKelven, giving to members of Congress a salary of \$1500 a year instead of the present allowance of \$8 a day. It seems to us that the substitution of a fixed salary for the present pro diem would have an excellent effect. We agree with the Staunton Spectator that it will tend very much to shorten the sessions and save a deal of money to the treasury.

It is obvious that some remedy is demanded for the waste of time and treasure under the present system. Congress has degenerated into a political debating club, in which the claims of presidential aspirants are canvassed to the exclusion of the public business. There is no necessity for this interference of Congress in a matter which properly belongs to the people. What a commentary it affords upon the Republican theory that the people select as well as elect their chief magistrate. The members virtually take this business out of the hands of their constituents by their wire working intrigues and speeches in every session preceding a Presidential election. Were a fixed salary adopted, short speeches would be the order of the day, and the affairs of the nation would receive attention, instead of members neglecting their own business and meddling with that which belongs to others.

Congress.—In the Senate, on Tuesday, the joint resolutions affirming the policy of non-intervention were further debated by Mr. Mason, who spoke in their support.

In the House of Representatives the Navy discipline bill was discussed and passed over informally; and subsequently the Homestead bill was considered in Committee of the Whole on the state of the Union.

In the Senate, on Wednesday, the bill determining the representation of California under the seventh census was further debated.

The Deficiency bill was reported with amendments.

In the House of Representatives reports were made from the Committee on the Public Lands, and the Homestead bill was then considered in Committee of the Whole on the state of the Union.

The Markets. CHARLOTTE, April 9.—COTTON.—A good deal of irregularity attended the transactions throughout the whole of the preceding week. The market was very much depressed, and when we closed our inquiries the better qualities were an 1/8 easier, while the common qualities had suffered a reduction of about 1/4. The transactions during the last two days, particularly those of yesterday, show a decidedly advancing tendency in prices, and the market may be said to have closed at about 1/2 advance on most qualities, on the prices reported in our review of the 2d inst.—The sales of the week average 12,000 bales, at prices ranging from 54 to 84.

There has been a good demand for most qualities of Long Cotton this week and the demand is fully up to the receipts, which comprise 324 bales. Former prices not only have been fully sustained, but the transactions establish a slight improvement on the rates of the previous week.

COLUMBIA, April 10.—COTTON.—The cotton market during yesterday and to-day was almost brought to a stand; not, however, from the want of demand or the reduction in prices, for the former is still active and good, and the latter strong and very full, but merely in consequence of the small supply on sale; consequently the transaction of the two days have been confined to some 22 bales, at prices ranging from 54 to 72 cents.

CAMDEN, April 10.—The Cotton Market has been somewhat animated since our last, with an upward tendency in prices. We quote extremes at 5 to 75.
