

WASHINGTON, April 26, 1852.

The Senate is still engaged in debating the deficiency bill.

The House having determined to close debate on the "Homestead Bill," on Thursday next, members are busily engaged in grinding out speeches for Bancroft. This bill gives them an opportunity of showing to their constituents how they agonized, plead and struggled to induce Uncle Sam to give to each of them a farm, without money and without price—the friends of the measure are confident of its passage in the House, by at least thirty majority, and the Senate, by a majority proportionally larger. It is said, a certain member who personally is in favor of the passage of this bill, will be obliged to vote against it, to prevent the depopulation of the District, land being so poor, that as soon as his constituents meet in they can get a good farm of 160 acres for nothing, they will immediately take up the line of march for the new settlements. He represents this District?

A week or two since, when it was agreed that Joint Committee on Printing had assumed the power of abrogating in effect the contract for printing, and giving the work to the "Union" and "Republic," and at prices much higher than practical and responsible men had offered to do it for, the House repudiated their action, and referred the report back to the Committee. The House then appointed a Select Committee to investigate the whole subject. This rebuke would have prevented most men from acting further in the matter—not so with members of this Printing Committee, for they with hot haste have made another contract with the same parties, and although the Committee have not yet reported their action to the House, enough has been elicited to lead to the belief that the prices now agreed to be paid are much higher than those originally offered, and which were rejected by the House.

THE GIRLS OF CALIFORNIA.—Some young fellow, writing to his sister in Zanesville, Ohio, says:
