CAMDEN MARKET, Nov. 19. COTTON.—The demand for cotton continues good, but at a slight reduction on our last quotations, extremes ranging at 8 to 9 1/2, Charleston quotations, 9 1/2 to 10.

Telegraphic Intelligence. Later from Europe—Arrival of the Asia at New York.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 19.—8 40 a. m. The British Mail Steamship Asia, Capt. Judkins, has arrived at New York from Liverpool, which port she left on the 6th inst.

THE LIVERPOOL MARKET.—The Cotton market was dull and unchanged, and only a limited business transacted at previous rates. The sales for the three days since the departure of the Atlantic, on the 6th instant, comprised twenty-two thousand bales, of which speculators took six thousand and five hundred. The sales during the week amounted to fifty-four thousand five hundred bales, of which speculators purchased twenty thousand, and exporters three thousand seven hundred and fifty.

Flour and Breadstuffs had further advanced. Provisions were unchanged.—Naval Stores were very active at advanced rates. Coffee was dull. Rice was active. Sugar had advanced 6d. per cwt.

HAVRE COTTON MARKET.—Cotton in Havre during the week has been dull, and the sales only comprised eleven thousand bales against 25,000 (!) bales imported during the same period. The stock of Cotton at Havre, exclusive of that on shipboard, amounted to 18,000 bales. New Orleans *Tres Ordinaire* was quoted at 90 1/2, Mobile at 94 1/2, and Upland at 91 1/2.

LONDON MONEY MARKET.—Consols for money closed at from 100 3/8 to 100 1/4. STATE OF TRADE.—At Manchester trade has fallen off, but prices are not lower.

ENGLAND.—The British Parliament assembled on the 4th inst., and the Hon. Charles Le Fevre Shaw, was elected Speaker of the House of Commons. FRANCE.—The Senate assembled on the 4th inst., and resolved to refer the question of re-establishing the Empire to a vote of the people.

SPAIN.—General Concha has sailed from Barcelona with five hundred troops for Cuba. ITALY.—Nine of Edward Murray's fellow prisoners have been shot at Aucona.
