Foul Murder.
On last Sunday morning the dead body of Aaron, a slave belonging to Mr. Abner Bushnell of this place, was found lying in a room of Mr. B.'s carriage shop.

The boy, it is thought, was killed by some one, but as yet nothing has been disclosed by which to ascertain, or detect the murderer. Aaron was a workman and slept in the room where he labored. One of his own tools, a chisel, was selected as the instrument of his death. The blow was evidently aimed with murderous intent, for the jugular vein was entirely severed and the throat slightly cut. Apparent signs of struggling were visible near the corpse, supposed to have occurred while bleeding to death. When found his head was almost immersed in blood, inasmuch that it became necessary to remove the clotting gore in order to ascertain the location and extent of the wound. Edgfield Advertiser.

DISTRESSING SUICIDE.—Father, Mother, and their Child Drowned.—Louisville, Dec. 6.—A dreadful tragedy has occurred on board the steamboat James Willingear, from St. Louis, while on her way down to this city. Among the deck passengers was a family composed of Daniel Street, his wife and four children. When near Evansville, the wife suddenly seized her youngest child, an infant, and jumped into the river with it. The husband immediately leaped after her, and all three sunk to rise no more. The three remaining children were taken charge of by the passengers, and were landed at New Albany in the care of their grandfather. Nearly sixty dollars were contributed by the passengers for the support of the children.

DEATH OF JAMES ROBERTSON, Esq.—We have the painful duty of announcing the death of James Robertson Esq. long a distinguished merchant, and one of our most useful and esteemed citizens. A native of Scotland, he was more than thirty years a resident of Charleston, and enjoyed to an unlimited extent, the confidence and respect of the community. Noted for the strict integrity and honor which characterized all his dealings, his fidelity as a friend, his active benevolence, and his public spirit, his death has caused the most poignant regret to a large circle of warmly attached relatives, friends and acquaintances.—Charleston Mercury.
