 The Board of Control was in session Monday. The net profits for the year, in this county, ending Dec. 31, 1906, are as follows: Lexington, \$2,853.29; Lewiedale, \$963.88; Peak, \$1,314.73, making a total for the county of \$5,166.90. Of this amount one-half goes to the town in which the dispensary is located, the other half goes to the county. This is the best showing made since the system was inaugurated, and shows that the people still drink dispensary "booze."


