The Lexington County Fair Association will have a voting contest for the most popular young lady at the fair to be crowned Queen at the fair on the last day.


Misses Cecile and Veda Barre, two of our admired and popular young ladies, have left for Winthrop college where they will continue their studies for the session.

Mrs. D. R. Haltiwanger is confined to her home on Depot street suffering with a severe attack of of tonsillitis.


Mrs. Elizabeth Boozer has returned from the Columbia Hospital very much improved. She underwent a serious operation about two weeks ago.
