Headquarters at Columbia to be commanded by Col. J. D. Greene, 6th U. S. Infantry, with Company "H," 5th U. S. Cavalry, Companies "H" and "K," 6th U. S. Infantry, and four companies of the 13th Maine Volunteers, as a garrison."
