"I have eyes to see for myself and will not go to act as snail's judgment. I desire to be an independent, and constitutional Conservative, and stand by my rights as guaranteed by the constitution of the government. It is a little strange to me that there should be such a lingering desire to create prejudice so unnecessarily and uselessly. Now I will state the facts as they are in regard to the caucuses which made out the two lists of committees and agreed upon a list of nominees, chairman and members of the respective committees and presented it for action. I was not invited to it. I was not notified, as a chairman at all, but placed upon a committee consisting of the following members: Messrs. Greener, Johnson, and myself. On this list was placed (more or less on each committee) some who were on the list of the Regulars. The Regular Republicans also held a nominating caucus, to which they were courteous enough to invite me, unexpectedly, as an independent Conservative, and showed me they placed me on their list, first, as chairman on the committee of agriculture, and then as a member of the following committees: No. 1, on agriculture, on public lands, on county officers and officers, on medical affairs. These two lists were acted upon separately in the following manner: The committee of agriculture, of which I was chairman, and the remainder of the members on each committee. The chairman of the committee on agriculture was first nominated; Hope on list No. 1, T. Q. Donaldson on list No. 2, made by the Independents and Conservatives. These voted against me generally and sustained their nominee. I was elected by the majority. This being the decision, and the weakness of No. 2 being so apparent, I saw no necessity or usefulness in turning this or that way in filling up the respective committees with a suitable number of members as they stood on the list. In fact, the Independent and Conservative members of the committee to fight for their arrangement of the committees. of justice have not obscured his vision, and although men will come to him to see the wisdom of his principles; for do we think that the General Assembly will dare any attempt to thwart him in the work which he has so clearly and emphatically set out.

We copy from the Charleston News and Courier a synopsis of the policy laid down in the message, as follows: "Governor Chamberlain calls attention to the fact that, in the late caucuses, the two political parties, which sought supremacy were equally emphatic in their demand for the correction of abuses. Only two parties appeared at the polls; both of whom professed to seek similar ends by similar means. Governor Chamberlain says that he will, therefore, rely for support upon those members of the General Assembly who were opposed to him; as confidently as upon those who favored his election. The paramount duty, he says, is the practice and enforcement of economy and honesty in the administration of the government. In his opinion, our evils are chiefly the result of a corrupt and dishonest administration, and the chief duty of the government should be directed to the subject of the collection, appropriation and disbursement of the public funds. He admits that the valuations of property for taxation have been unjust and oppressive, but the total assessments have been reduced, thirty or forty million dollars this year, and he stands ready, he says, to co-operate with the General Assembly in any measure calculated to obtain a just valuation of all property for taxation, according to its true money value, and so far as the faithful execution of the law depends upon officers appointed by him, no county shall have just cause for complaint. He urges that the General Assembly consider the desirability of causing a census to be taken, and to be taken by the people, instead of appointed by the Governor, and advises that they be required to give bond to the counties as well as to the State. The taxes, he says, should be strictly limited to the actual requirements of the government, and contingent funds, which have consumed \$376,882 in the past six years, should be totally abolished. The legislative expenses have amounted to an average of \$320,405 for each regular session, and bills not amounting to the amount of \$125,275 are outstanding. These expenses must be reduced, he says, by doing by reducing the length of the session to thirty days, by avoiding the consideration of special acts which could be covered by general laws, by reducing the number of subordinate officers and attaches, and by cutting off the contingent or incidental legislative expenses, which have been as much as \$190,000 a session, with half a million dollars of legislative pay certificates still unpaid. The Public Printing system he declares to be incapable of defence, or excuse, in three years its cost was \$918,629. The entire discontinuance of the practice of jobbing the laws, the advertising in the newspapers, is strongly recommended. He urges, also, that the expenditures of the State be kept within the receipts, for the year ending October 31, 1874, the deficiencies were \$172,619. The issuing of certificates of indebtedness, and of orders or warrants when no money is in hand to pay them, is condemned. In the matter of abolishing unnecessary offices, and reducing salaries, Gov. Chamberlain will agree to any measure which the General Assembly may adopt. In emphatic words he declares that the settlement of the public debt, under the act of 1872, is the most important duty of the Legislature, and that the popular indignation against the act may be so great as to demand about two million dollars of bonds have been issued under the act in question, and the entire State debt, when so funded, will amount to only \$5,740,016. For the outstanding bills of the Bank of the State, Governor Chamberlain holds the State to be responsible, and advises that they be declared receivable local paid due taxes, and be receivable in installments for the State of Georgia upon an equity justice system. He says that the act is unjust and oppressive, and if it be continued, the State will be a debtor to the people, and the number of judges be reduced by at least one-third, and he promises that he will support as trial justices only persons who will know the law and will use their powers to preserve the rights and protect the interests of all. The passage of a law for the registration of electors is recommended, as a matter of obvious justice as well as a mandate of the Constitution. The repeal of the law requiring insurance companies doing business in the State to make a deposit of bonds or stocks with a trustee, and the repeal of the act which modeled, also the proposed Fair, is recommended. The pardoning power will no longer be abused. Governor Chamberlain promises that the elections will be rare when he will be justified in setting aside the judgment of courts and the verdict of juries. He advises that there be no reduction of the sum now appropriated for educational purposes, but the General Assembly is invited to see if the want of efficiency on the part of the County School Commissioners cannot be remedied. These, in brief, are the measures of reform which Governor Chamberlain advises, and to which he declares himself to be unalterably pledged."

A French Newspaper Office. A Paris correspondent says, in describing the office of the Figaro: "Opening upon the grand gallery that runs around the Spanish palace or rotunda, are the rooms or halls that lead to the rooms of the various offices. These are all furnished in magnificent style, with rosewood furniture, rich carpets, tapestry, bronzes and marble statues. Some rooms accommodate a single writer, others two or three.
