

money, and guarantees the notes of the State for their declared value, and imposes fines and imprisonment on all who refuse to take them.

A military commission has been established for re-organizing the Roman troops. All promotions since November are annulled until a commission shall have reported on the conduct of each man. The Triumvirates and Cardinals have substituted a commission for the purpose of prosecuting the authors of the outrages committed against religion during the revolution.

Great Britain.—No news of importance. Queen Victoria and family still in Scotland. The cholera was raging in London, Dublin, Berlin, Vienna and Paris.

COMMERCIAL NEWS.

Cotton.—The market remains unchanged, except the middling and lower grades which are a shade easier. The sales of the week amounted to 36,280 bales of which speculators took 840 American, and exporters 5,070 bales. To-day the sales amounted to 7,000 bales of all kinds. Upland range 4 1-2 a 5 7-3; New Orleans 4 3-4 for middling and lower classes; Alabama 5 a 5 3 4d. The imports of the week were 6,093 bales. The demand was brisk on the day the steamer sailed, and the market closed firm.

In politics reports are as "thick as the leaves in Valambrosia."

Among others, that the President is dissatisfied with the Secretary of State, who is accused of not "rendering unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's."

That the mission to Russia is kept back for one of the cabinet, who may find it more agreeable than Washington after the meeting of Congress.

By the way, this Russian mission is considered a sort of Siberia. Sending a minister to St. Petersburg is looked on as an honorable disgrace—a method of getting rid of a troublesome politician.

I only re-echo the opinion of others capable of judging, when I say the Cabinet can't hold together long after the meeting of Congress. It represents only cliques, has done Gen. Taylor incalculable harm, and inclines too much to the third party principle.

The Republic is the organ of this party, in contradiction to the old whig party journal, the National Intelligencer.

The census printing is the *pons as inorum* which will blow up everything next winter.

This matter of printing is going to get the administration in some difficulty—an impeachment of the Secretary of the Interior is threatened.

THE CONTEST IN MISSOURI.—Colonel Benton was hissed at a meeting in Howard county Mo., a short time since, but he persisted until the people heard him with patience. He was first threatened with a coat of tar and feathers, and afterwards with lynching. Delegations from several other counties were present to protect him from personal injury. In Cole county, resolutions calling upon him to resign, and strongly reprobating his action relative to the instructions of the Legislature, were adopted. At another meeting, nearly every man went armed, so bitter and violent is the contest.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN?—The New York Express, a whig paper, alluding to Mr. Poussin's recall says:

"We fear there are Cabinet social difficulties deeper than any of these things which have led to, or stimulated this quarrel. We hear of scenes somewhat similar to this which occurred in the early part of Gen. Jackson's administration."

HAYTI AN EMPIRE.—Solemnly, President of Hayti, has proclaimed himself Emperor, and has gone through the ceremony of a coronation in imitation of Napoleon. So much for the Black Republic.

The ceremony is represented as having been ludicrous in the extreme, though carried out with great gravity.—*Columbia Telegraph.*

"FIGURES NEVER LIE."

If the above be true, the present Administration must feel its force in a very disagreeable way. The people in this country pronounce their approval or disapproval of their officers through the ballot box; and if the elections which have recently taken place, cast the shadows of coming events, then is the Administration of Gen. Taylor destined to be one of the most unpopular the country has ever had. The judgment of the people is written against it in the following result since the Presidential election last year.
