

DEATH BY STARVATION.—A brother of John P. Post, the carpenter, died on Friday last, at Bergen City, under the following circumstances: He was a few months since a strong and healthy man. A few weeks ago he was told a fatal tumor was pressing against his entrails, and that he would starve to death. There was no surgical remedy, as nothing could successfully remove the cancerous ulcer. Gradually it compressed up the passage way and then digestion ceased, and the process of starvation began. The agony suffered by the dying man is indescribable.
