WHEREAS, sometime ago, this Board was petitioned to pass a resolution to submit a County subscription of \$200,000, to the Air-Line Railroad, to the legal voters of this County, on certain conditions; and, whereas, some of the friends of the enterprise now ask this Board to reduce the amount of said County subscription, and the town of Walthalla having subscribed \$50,000 to said Railroad, on certain condition; therefore, be it

Resolved, That it be submitted to the legal voters of said County, on the FIRST DAY of AUGUST next, whether or not this Board shall subscribe \$150,000 to the capital stock of the Air-Line Railroad, on the condition that said Road locate a depot within two miles of the Court House of said County, and the details of the subscription be left with the Board and be conducted so that no part of the subscription be paid until work on the grading of said Road be commenced within the County and only as the work progresses therein; that those voters who favor the subscription shall endorse on their tickets in said election, "Subscription," and those opposed, "No Subscription."
