To the Voters OF OCOOEE COUNTY.

Fellow Citizens: At a meeting of the citizens of Oconee County held in the Court House...

As most of you are aware, it is proposed to construct an Air-Line Railroad from Atlanta, Ga., to Charlotte, N. C.

The Road will be constructed from Charlotte to Greenville, and from Greenville to Greenville to the Alleghany mountains...

CONSIDER THE FOLLOWING FACTS: 1st. The Road, when completed, will be the shortest line that can ever be constructed south of the Alleghany mountains...

2d. It will run through a section of country in this State which has great natural advantages. We have a climate unequalled by that of any other section of the United States...

3d. The Road, when completed, will place us nearer to New York City by 70 miles than Augusta, Ga.; thus affording to our planters a better market for selling, and a cheaper market for buying, than Augusta or Columbia.

4th. In the construction of the Road through the County, there will be expended within the County not less than \$600,000, which will be paid to laborers, contractors and farmers for labor, materials and supplies...

ute, and at least \$150,000 more, which will come to us from abroad.

5th. The Road will impart a fresh impulse to every department of industry. It will bring population and capital into our midst, and develop the resources of the country...

6th. It will enhance the value of property, and furnish constant and remunerative employment to laborers and mechanics.

7th. If we reject the opportunity now offered us, others more worthy and more alive to their own interest are ready to seize it...

8th. The City of Charlotte and County of Mecklenburg, N. C., have already voted \$250,000 to the Road.

It is proposed to build this great Road through this State, so far as the aid our people give shall contribute to that end...

The County Commissioners propose to take \$150,000 in the capital stock of the Company, on the condition that said Company locate a depot within two miles of the Court House...

For the subscription of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars by the County Commissioners, an equal amount of stock will be issued. This stock will be placed in the hands of a trustee...

2d. It will run through a section of country in this State which has great natural advantages. We have a climate unequalled by that of any other section of the United States...

3d. The Road, when completed, will place us nearer to New York City by 70 miles than Augusta, Ga.; thus affording to our planters a better market for selling, and a cheaper market for buying, than Augusta or Columbia.

But again: We know the city of Augusta is already looking for a line which will connect with and draw the trade from the Blue Ridge Railroad.

But again: As to the question of taxes, alluded to heretofore, we may mention that the Blue Ridge Road, now running about half way through your County...

More: Although you have one road, freights and rates of travel are unreasonably high. The charges, at the depot at Walhalla alone, amount yearly to about \$30,000.

THE TRAINING OF CHILDREN.—SOME USEFUL HINTS.—A little tract, issued for distribution by the Ladies' Sanitary Association of London...

1. Never refuse a thing if it is harmless, but give it, if you are able, without delay. 2. Never give anything because it is offered for, that you have refused when asked for.

3. Be careful to observe real illness, and avoid causing bodily uneasiness from over-clothing, or cold or unwholesome food, such as candy, sugar-plums, sour fruit, or giving buns or cakes to quiet the child.

4. Avoid false promises. They are sure to be found out. 5. Avoid threats of all kinds. If believed, they make children timid, and injure both mind and body...

6. Never say anything untrue to a child. 7. Do not wreak your own bad temper, or visit your own feelings or fatigue and trouble on children, by being severe with them, or by saying, "You shan't have it, or "I won't give it to you," when there is no reason for refusal, except that you are yourself tired, or in trouble, or out of sorts.

8. Avoid giving orders, such as "Stand still," "Go on," "Hold your tongue," "Put it down," &c., unless you really mean that they should be obeyed; and the fewer orders you give the better.

9. Neither give too much pity, nor yet be severe and unkind when a child tumbles down or hurts itself. 10. Do not worry a child. Let it alone, and let it live in peace.

11. Teach it early to play alone and amuse itself. To sum up all in a few words—try to feel like a child; to enter into its griefs and joys, its trials and triumphs.
