

Correspondents from Versailles state that the same lack of organization which lost Napoleon his empire, prevails at the present time in the armies of the French Republic. In the meantime, the Communists still control Paris, and, though their army is diminished, it is still defiant. Misery, wretchedness and riot seem to prevail at the capital. All who can get away are flying from the plague-stricken city. Crime and debauchery appear to be holding high carnival there, and horrible blasphemous of all that mankind holds sacred are uttered as if they were something to be proud of. The world is becoming tired of the prolonged bloodshed. The commercial interests of Europe are suffering, and if the investing army does not hurry up its work, it ought to make way for the Germans, who will bring order to this pandemonium.

The Greenville Mountaineer says, when the cases of negro debts were called in the Court recently in session there, Judge Orr expressed his regret that he could not concur in the recent decision of the Supreme Court of this State, and that he would feel himself constrained to instruct the jury that debts contracted for slaves could not be collected, and that the prohibition in the State Constitution was not a violation of the Constitution of the United States, and suggested that it would perhaps be most prudent to continue all such cases until the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States upon the question should be announced. The members of the Bar approved of the suggestion, and all that class of cases was continued.

The Daily Union of the 10th instant, states that the Ku Klux visited Newberry C. H., on Sunday night last. They visited Messrs. Young and Hailstock, County Commissioners. Young resisted, and was badly wounded by a gun shot. He wounded a Ku Klux in the fray, WATT FAULKNER, who is now in jail. The Probate Judge, LEAHEY, has been compelled to leave.

The United States Senate is in session, considering in secret session, the treaty made by the Joint High Commission.
