PROCEEDINGS OF THE COURT.

ONLY TWO CONVICTIONS—PRESENTMENT OF GRAND JURY.

The summer term of the Court of General Sessions for Oconee county convened at Walhalla Monday morning, Judge R. O. Purdy presiding. Solicitor Boggs and Stenographer Long were on hand.

The grand jury returned the following TRUE BILLS:

- Jerry Perry, violation dispensary law. John Hardy, violation dispensary law. Jas. Barton, violation dispensary law. Arthur Steele, housebreaking and larceny. Ben Pugh, violation dispensary law. Alfred Mobley, larceny. Isaac Richards, larceny.

Grand jury returned no bill in the case of Donia Davis, infanticide. The following cases were DISPOSED OF:

- Jas. Barton, violating dispensary law. Plead guilty. Sentenced to three months on chain-gang, or pay a fine of \$100. Arthur Steele, housebreaking and larceny. Plead guilty. Sentenced to three years on chain-gang. J. M. Finley, disposing of property under lien. Continued by defendant. Wm. Roach, violation dispensary law. Continued. J. H. Barker, disposing of property under lien. Not pros. Judge Simpson, assault and battery with intent to kill. Settled. Robert Spencer, attempt at arson. Continued. Defendant sick. Justice, assault and battery with intent to kill. Continued. Ben Pugh, violation dispensary law. Continued. Alfred Mobley, larceny. Not guilty. N. L. and D. White, malicious trespass. Appeal from magistrate's court. Judge's takes papers. Opinion later.

At six o'clock Tuesday afternoon the court was adjourned sine die. The grand jury was discharged Monday afternoon.

Grand Jury Presentment—May Term.

We have passed on all the bills handed us by the solicitor. At the last term of the court we called the attention of the magistrates of the county to the law requiring them to submit their dockets to the County Commissioners quarterly, also to make monthly reports to the Treasurer and Auditor. The Supervisor informs us that only four magistrates have submitted their dockets. In this connection we will say that all magistrates who do not comply with this law will be presented at the next term of the court; and we recommend that this portion of this presentment be served on the magistrates of the county.

We are reliably informed that in some of the school districts, especially in the Oakway and Fair Play districts, teachers who are not entitled by law to teach in the public schools of the county, have been employed and paid out of the school funds. We recommend that the County Board of Education make an immediate and thorough investigation of these matters and report the result of said investigation to this grand jury at the next term of the court.

We recommend that the foreman of this jury, C. G. Jaynes, and J. W. McGee and J. W. Todd be appointed a committee to investigate the books of the county officers, with power to employ an expert if necessary. C. G. Jaynes, Foreman. May 28th, 1906.

Westminster Shows Great Enthusiasm.

The sturdy citizens of Westminster met in the Masonic Hall Friday night for the purpose of discussing the trolley line movement. A more enthusiastic meeting has never been held in Westminster. The hall was full of citizens before the hour of meeting arrived. The inclement weather did not put a damper on the Westminster spirit. The citizens want it clearly understood that they are deeply interested in this movement, and that they are going to do all in their power to bring the road here. We have double advantage in point of distance and levelness of country. There will be no cuts or trestles from Oakway to Westminster, whereas to go to Seneca will be three miles further, with trestles to build.

Westminster is the place for the road to touch the Southern; Seneca is already connected with Anderson by steam railway; Westminster is going to do all in her power to bring the road here.

At the meeting Westminster spirit was shown in many ways.

K. W. Marett, in a few well-chosen words, stated the object of the meeting. Dr. C. M. Walker was nominated and elected chairman; M. E. Brockman was elected secretary, and K. W. Marett assistant secretary.

John Carter was called on for a speech. He stated that he was deeply interested in the road and wanted it to come here. What he said brought forth many cheers.

Hon. A. Zimmerman was called on. He stated that he had always been deeply concerned about anything that meant progress for Westminster; that he had had experience in the way of railroads. He also said Westminster couldn't afford for this road to go elsewhere.

J. S. Carter did not make a speech, but expressed his hearty approval and co-operation.

The following gentlemen expressed their views and pledged their hearty support: J. M. Hull, Dr. H. E. Rosser, W. C. Peden, A. B. Stewart, C. E. O. Mitchell, P. W. Matheson, I. S. Pitts, Mr. Parker, T. C. Peden, J. W. McGee, Andrew Norris, J. G. Breazeale, T. N. Hall.

T. Peden Anderson spoke in behalf of his father, who could not be present on account of sickness. W. P. Anderson is deeply interested and will do all in his power to bring the road here.

W. S. Haley is heartily in favor of the road coming to Westminster.

Dr. W. J. Carter wants the road here.

D. I. Mulkey made a good talk favoring the road, and pledged liberally for its support.

Prof. M. E. Brockman, principal of the graded school, expressed, in a few words, the advantage it would be to Westminster in the way of building up our already excellent school.

After these expressions from Westminster's foremost citizens, how can any one fail to see that we are deeply interested? A subscription list was started and a very liberal amount was subscribed, on condition that the road come to Westminster.

For some unknown cause a number of Westminster's citizens, who subscribed to the original paper, had their names left off the one that was circulated in the meeting. We don't understand why their names should have been taken off. We want the people of Oconee county to know that we are deeply interested in the proposed road, and want it to come HERE!

J. S. Carter, W. S. Haley and K. W. Marett were appointed a committee to draw up a paper that would state that Westminster must have the road or her citizens would not subscribe towards building the same. These gentlemen will raise Westminster's share towards building the proposed trolley line.

William O. Singleton in Battle.

List of battles fought in the war between the Confederate States and the United States that I was in, giving dates only as to memory. I was in Company B, Palmetto Sharpshooters, Regiment S. C. V. These battles are as follows:

- Battles of Fort McGruder, May 4, 1862, Virginia; Seven Pines, May 20, 1862, Virginia; Gaines's Mill, in June, 1862, Virginia; Frasier's Farm, in July, 1862, Virginia; Second Manasses, in August, 1862, Virginia; South Mountain, Maryland, in September, 1862; Sharpsburg, Maryland, September 17, 1862; Below Franklin, Virginia, May 28, 1863; Lookout Mountain, Tennessee, 1863; Huff's Ferry, Tennessee, 1863; Lenore Station, Tennessee, 1863; Campbell Station, Tennessee, 1863; Knoxville, Tennessee, 1863; Chinyee Station, Virginia, 1864; Guinea Station, Virginia, 1864; Wilderness, Virginia, 1864; and in the siege at Petersburg and Richmond, Va. which was a most continuous gunshot, and from the mentioned siege to Appomattox Court House, Va., which was a march of day and night and a continuous skirmish battle of seven or eight days duration, up to the surrender, which took place the 9th of April, 1865. This I certify to the best of my memory. May this be kept in memory by my posterity, and may God so preserve them as to keep them out of war; while I trust they may ever be ready to defend the common rights of the country in which they live. This May the 31st, 1897. William O. Singleton.
