16. Verse 7—Why cannot a man receive the mercy of God if he is cruel either in act or speech to man or beast?

17. Verse 8—What is it to be pure in heart?

18. Why is it that so few persons are as conscious of the presence of God as if they saw him with the outward eyes?

19. Verse 9—Why is not a quarrelsome man, or one who fans the flame of dissension, a child of God?

COL. HENRY D. CAPERS DEAD, Was Well Known to Every Section of South Carolina.

(Atlanta Journal, 19th.)
Col. Henry D. Capers, for many years connected with the internal revenue department of the government, died at his home, 14 Simpson street, Thursday morning at three o'clock. He was 78 years of age, and had been in failing health for several years. His illness reached an acute stage about five weeks ago, when he took to bed.

Col. Capers was widely known and beloved in Atlanta, and over the State. He was a typical gentleman of the old school.

He was a son of the late Bishop William L. Capers, a Methodist bishop of South Carolina, and was born in Anderson, S. C., on June 2, 1835. He was a brother of the late Bishop Ellison Capers, the Episcopal bishop of South Carolina, who died a year ago.

Col. Capers was a lieutenant colonel in the Confederate army. He was at first chief clerk and disbursing agent at Montgomery, and in 1861 entered active service for the Lost Cause, and fought throughout the four years of the war.

He was married twice. His first wife was Miss Mary Means, daughter of Dr. Alexander Means, D. D., LL. D., the second president of Emory College, and one of the most noted scientists of his times, and who during his life had been president of five different colleges in the State. By this union there were four children, three of whom are still living. They are Mrs. B. M. Harlan and A. M. Capers, of Calhoun, Ga., and Wm. Capers, of Tampa, Fla. His second wife, who survives him, was Miss Jennie Buckner Gwyn, niece of Gen. Buckner, of Civil War fame. Mrs. H. E. W. Palmer, of Atlanta, is his niece.

Col. Capers was a devoted member of the Episcopal church. The funeral and interment will take place at Oxford, Ga., some time to-day, and he will be buried in the old family lot in the cemetery there.

"NEGRO IDEA OF JUSTICE."

An "Alleged Story" About a Darlington Case in Court.

The March number of the Old Bay Line Magazine, published by the Baltimore Steam Packet Company, of Baltimore, contains, among many other interesting and amusing anecdotes, the following on the "Negro Idea of Justice":

I was visiting Darlington, S. C., in 1868, writes Eli Perkins, where I attended court, presided over by a negro justice.

Caesar Green, an aged colored man, had been arrested for stealing a cow, killing her and disposing of the meat. The hide and horns found on Green's premises were proof of the crime. In fact, Green confessed to stealing the cow.

"Well, Mr. Green," said the dark-judge, "you stands 'victed ob stealin' de cow. Now, what you got to say for jusselt? What you gwine do 'bout it?"

"I hain't got nuffin to say, judge, but I 'spose justice demands dat I pay fer de cow?"

"Yes, you's got to pay seventeen dollars fer de cow," said the justice, sternly, "and dat will settle it."

"But, Judge, I hain't got de seventeen dollars."

"No money at all?"

"No, not a cent, Judge."

"Does enybody owe you any money?" asked the judge.

"Yes," said the culprit, "Jack Smith owes me seventeen dollars, and he's done owed it to me since Christmas."

"Very well," said the judge, sternly. "Justice must take her course. De law must be satisfied. I order the sheriff to discharge de pris'ner an' arrest Jack Smith, an' hold him in close 'fincement till he pays de seventeen dollars."

When I left Darlington, two weeks after, I learned Smith had paid the seventeen dollars and justice (colored) was satisfied.

THE DEMOCRACY OF OCONEE.

Call for All Democratic Clubs to Meet and Organize.

The Democratic clubs of Oconee county are hereby called to meet and organize on the 27th day of April, 1912, (the fourth Saturday), at the hour designated by the president of each club; and in case the president should not issue a call, then the club shall meet at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and elect officers. At the same time they shall elect delegates to the County Convention—one delegate for each twenty-five members, or majority fraction thereof.

A convention of the Democratic party in Oconee county, South Carolina, is also called to meet in the Court House at Walhalla, at 11 o'clock a. m., on the first Monday in May (the 6th), for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing two years, and also for the purpose of electing delegates to the State Democratic Convention, to be held in Columbia, S. C., on the third Wednesday in May, 1912, (the 15th), and to transact such other business as may be brought before the said County Convention. W. G. Hughs, Chairman Executive Committee.
