IMPORTANT TO PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Last Notice to Trustees and Teachers Concerning Certain Matters.

Walhalla, Dec. 7, 1920.

The school trustees and teachers of Oconee county are urged to take careful note of the following facts:

1. All teachers' certificates issued prior to July 1, 1920, must be converted into State certificates. Application blanks will be mailed upon request. This is the last of several notices in regard to this. It is surprising that many of our teachers have not yet had their certificates converted.

2. All certificates must be recorded in my office before the holders can draw pay.

3. Teachers holding claims issued prior to July 1, 1920, will please send them to me before Dec. 25, 1920, and I shall endeavor to get them satisfactorily adjusted.

4. It is expedient that trustees of rural graded schools read the rural graded school law and make application for such amount of State aid as the law allows. Application blanks will be in the hands of the trustees by the time this notice is read. Fill the blanks out accurately and mail them promptly to me. These applications are approved in the order in which they are received by the State Superintendent; so do not wait until the funds are exhausted before you make application. Read the school law and meet its requirements.

5. Some of the application blanks for term extension aid sent out by me several weeks ago have not yet been received at my office. Those who attended to the matter promptly have received their money already.

This means much to the schools of Oconee just now, as there is a scarcity of funds with which to operate our schools.

This is a matter of vital importance, and I urge every teacher and trustee in the county to attend to this business promptly.

Armenia Joins Hands with Soviet?

London, Dec. 4.—Russian Soviet troops captured Erivan, the Armenian capital, on Thursday, and Armenia has declared itself a Soviet Republic. It is asserted in a wireless dispatch received from Moscow today. The troops of the old Armenian government have placed themselves at the disposal of the Soviet administration, the dispatch declares. "Azerbaijan," the message adds, "has voluntarily renounced the disputed provinces of Zangemar, Nakhichevan and Nagorny and Karabagh, which have been handed over to Soviet Armenia."

SPOT-LIGHT CAUSES TROUBLE.

One Anderson Man Shot by Another as Result of Quarrel.

(Anderson Mail, Nov. 6.)

Columbus Shaw, aged 29, a well known white man of near Belton, was instantly killed last night near Riverside Mill by being shot four times through the heart. **I. E. Wiles**, known as "Shack" Wiles, is now in the Anderson county jail, charged with the killing of **Shaw**. **Wiles** having come to the jail and surrendered shortly after the killing was reported. **Shaw** was shot four times, the weapon used being a revolver, about a 38-calibre. The bullets all entered the body just beneath the left shoulder blade, ranging inward and downward and several of them passing directly through the heart. One cut the large blood vessel directly over the heart. The wound of exit was just above the ribs, and the bullets on emerging tore a great hole in the side of the body.

According to **Wiles'** statement at the jail, he was riding with another man and had a spotlight upon his car. **Columbus Shaw** was driving a Ford, and the two cars met. **Wiles** states that **Shaw** yelled to him to "shut off that damn spotlight," and that he slowed up his car almost to a walk, and then stopped.

"**Columbus** said," continued **Mr. Wiles**, "Shut off your engine and come here." **Wiles** says that he went to the standing car and got upon the running board of the car to better see who was on the inside. When he got upon the running board, he says, **Shaw** asked him if he didn't believe he would kill him. After laughing off the matter, he says **Shaw** drew his gun, and that he caught him by the right hand, bringing the gun around behind the seat of the car, where it fired once. He says he then drew his pistol and fired into the back of **Columbus Shaw**. **Shaw** fell across the side of the machine, and **Wiles** came on to the business section of the city, where he says he met **Policeman Aiken** and surrendered his gun. He then started to the jail and met the sheriff coming out of the jail yard.

The man was taken into the jail and locked up. **Jailer Hall** stated this morning that **Wiles** seemed to be drunk when he came to the jail last night. The tragedy occurred about 11 o'clock last night. The Ford car in which **Shaw** was killed was at the jail this morning, and it presented a very gruesome sight. One of the bullets had been fired through the back of the front seat of the machine, and this had torn out the upholstery. The floor of the car, and the left running board were red with clotted blood, and showed that after **Shaw** had bled for a long time, hanging over the side of the car.

Shaw was a son of **Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Shaw**, of near Belton, and is survived by his parents and the following brothers and sisters: **Eugene Shaw**, **Clarke Shaw**, **Peter Shaw**, **John Shaw**, and **Mrs. Morris Bannister** and **Mrs. Frank Andrews**.
