### REQUIREMENTS FOR RENEWAL Of Certificates—Third Grade Certificates Will Not be Renewed.

Superintendent of Education L. C. Spears has received the following communication from the State Board of Examiners:

A third grade certificate shall not be renewed.

A first grade or a second grade certificate shall be renewed when the holder complies with the following requirements:

1. Presentation of satisfactory written evidence from school officials showing that the holder has taught successfully during one-half the life of the certificate.

2. Presentation of a record of successful and satisfactory summer school work. Every approved summer school must run at least six weeks. Teachers receiving certificates credit on summer school work must attend at least twenty days, must pursue at least two approved courses, and must stand satisfactory examinations at the close of the summer school.

Note—The State Board of Education, at a recent meeting, waived the reading circle requirement for the renewal of certificates which expire in 1922.

For this year only, the State Board of Education also waived the summer school requirement for the holders of first grade certificates granted on A. B. or B. S. degrees from accredited colleges.

### Newberry Has \$25,000 Fire.

Newberry, April 28.—The Newberry Lumber Company, located in this city, caught fire this afternoon at 2 o'clock. The fire started in the boiler room at the plant near the Southern depot and the Newberry Cotton Mill. The estimated loss is between \$25,000 and \$30,000, with no insurance except about \$2,000 on the newest planing machine. Practically \$1,000 worth of building supplies and paint were saved. This was the largest fire Newberry has experienced since 1907. The reason so little insurance was carried was because the mill was so near the railroad that the insurance was too high.

### AGED COUPLE DIE SAME DAY.

Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Stone Passed to Roward on April 26th.

T. J. Stone was born in Anderson county 72 years ago, and died at his home near Seneca on April 26th, 1922, at 7.45 a. m., after an illness of about one week with flu. The deceased moved to Oconee county from Anderson with his father and located on the farm on which he had lived all these years to the time of his death. He was married in the year 1879 to Miss Mary Hunt, of Townville section, and to this union five children were born, three of whom are living—H. P. Stone, Mrs. Lula Moore and Mrs. Etta Cox, all of the Seneca section. He also leaves the following sisters to mourn his passing: Mrs. Fannie Sanders and Mrs. John F. Martin, Seneca, and Mrs. S. A. Amicah, Walhalla.

Mrs. Mary Stone, wife of T. J. Stone, was born in Oconee county in the year 1846, and died at her home near Seneca on the 26th day of April, 1922, at 6 p. m., after an illness of about ten days from flu. Mrs. Stone leaves the following brothers and sisters to mourn her sad death: Mrs. W. M. Brown, of Oakway; Mrs. H. J. Reeder, Westminster; Mrs. Janie Blackwell, Mountain Rest; W. H. Hunt, Seneca, and A. P. Hunt, Fair Play.

The funerals of Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Stone were conducted in the Return Baptist church on April 27th at 12 o'clock noon, Rev. L. M. Lyda, of Walhalla, conducting the services. Following the services in the church the bodies of these highly respected people were laid to rest in the cemetery hard by to await God's call on that great day of days.

It will be noted from the above that Mr. and Mrs. Stone died on the same day, Mr. Stone at 7.45 a. m. and his wife at 6 p. m. In the passing of these good people Oconee has lost two of her very best people. The section in which they lived will miss them. They were good neighbors to all who needed help. They were kind and good to the poor and needy. As the years go by many will rise up and thank God that these good people lived and labored in that section of our county.

Bro. and Sister Stone were leading members of the Return Baptist church, where they will be missed as we meet from time to time. Mrs. Stone had been providentially hindered from attending the services of church for more than a year, being confined to her home on account of her poor health. She loved her church, and the fact that she was not able to attend the services there was a source of much regret to her.

Brother Stone was true to his church and to his pastor. He was loyal to his church and to his pastor. He was loyal to Christ and gave liberally to all worthy objects. He was a man whose life counted for good and for God. He loved the true and hated the false. Truth and honesty were looked upon by this good man as apples of gold in pictures of silver. ### THE OCONEE DEMOCRATS MET

In Convention at the Walhalla Court House on May 1st.

The Oconee County Democratic Convention met at Walhalla, in the county court-house, on Monday, May 1. James M. Moss was elected temporary chairman and Wilbur D. White was elected temporary secretary.

On motion of J. W. Shelor, it was voted to dispense with the committee on credentials, and the election of county chairman and secretary and treasurer was held. For chairman Jas. M. Moss received 34 votes and James H. Brown 45, the latter being declared elected. Wilbur D. White was elected secretary and treasurer of the convention and also of the county executive committee.

On motion, it was decided that the names of the executive committeemen from the various clubs be handed to the secretary, and same be ratified.

Dr. E. C. Doyle was elected State executive committeeman.

A motion allowing the delegates to the State Convention to name their own alternates was passed.

A resolution disapproving of the General Assembly continuing its session into the Sabbath on the last day of its regular annual meeting was passed.

A resolution asking the State Convention to change the rules governing the holding of primary elections in the Democratic party so that the costs of holding them be borne equally by candidates for office who pay their assessments to the State chairman and candidates for office who pay their assessments to the county chairman, and also whenever in any county all county offices are filled, the entire expense of any additional primary elections to fill State or Federal offices be borne entirely out of the fund contributed by candidates for those offices.

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### Former French President Dead.

Paris, April 28.—Former President Deschanel, of France, died this afternoon. M. Deschanel was taken ill with influenza a few days ago and it was announced that the complications had developed and his condition was serious.

After his resignation from the French Presidency in September of 1920, M. Deschanel lived in retirement for several months. His condition improved steadily, and late that year it was announced that he had completely recovered his health. In January of last year he became a candidate in the Senatorial elections, being returned for Eure et Loir on January 9. He began attending the Senate sessions the following May, and in January of this year was appointed a member of the Senate foreign affairs committee to replace M. Poincare when the latter assumed the premiership.

Richard Croker Is No More.

New York, April 29.—Richard Croker, former leader of Tammany Hall, and one of the best known political figures of his time, is dead at his country estate in Ireland, according to a private cablegram received here Saturday afternoon by Arthur Brisbane. The message came from Mrs. Croker, and simply said: "Mr. Croker passed away suddenly."
