RAIL ROAD ACCIDENT.—The through train on the Wilmington and Manchester R. R., on the 13th inst. met with an accident near Kingsville, the front axle of the tender broke, throwing the mail and express cars, down an embankment, ten feet high, the cars turning completely over. The Express Messenger Capt. H. H. Leon, and Mail Agent Wiggins, were severely, but not dangerously hurt.

In reply to the criticism and abuse to which Judge Carpenter was subjected, in the Legislature during the debate on the Bill to increase the salaries of Judges, the Judge has written a letter to both houses, demanding an investigation of his official conduct.

DROWNED.—Oliver B. Brunner, on Tuesday night last, got up out of his bed, and undressed as he was, walked out of the house and across the field, about half a mile, into Bull Swamp, and into Bull Swamp Creek, where he was drowned. The unfortunate young man was subject to epileptic fits, and it is supposed that he was suffering from one of these fits when he was drowned.

Wm. R. Treadwell, Esq., Coroner, held an Inquest over the body yesterday morning. The verdict of the Jury was that deceased came to his death by accidental drowning.

The "Negro Labor National Convention" is in session in Washington. South Carolina is represented, and the delegates from this State take a prominent part. One of them, Winbush, went far ahead of all the others in asserting the rights of the freedmen, proclaiming that the next United States senator, from South Carolina would be a negro, and that he himself was raising a colored militia regiment, that would whip out the Ku-Klux.

THE PEOPLE'S BANK OF SOUTH CAROLINA.—Mr. John B. Lafitte of this city, was elected, yesterday, president of the People's Bank of South Carolina, in the place of Mr. James G. Gibbs, who had resigned. Mr. Lafitte is a gentleman of high standing in commercial circles, and his large experience, business tact and undoubted financial ability will be of great value to the well known bank of which he is now the head. The People's Bank will, we believe, resume active business in a few days, and if sound and able management count for anything, it will soon become one of the most popular, as well as responsible, banking institutions in the State.—Charleston News.

A MAMMOTH HOG.—James G. Harris, Esq., of our town, butchered a hog last week, nineteen months old, weighing gross, 640 pounds, nett, 570 pounds, from the usual offal a detrimmings of which was obtained 120 pounds of lard.
