OUR OPINION OF SALEDAY'S DOINGS.—We were astonished to hear that we had given offence to many persons by publicly noticing the drunkenness of sale-day.

The Darling Southerner says: "A very large number of persons—white and colored—were assembled at the Village on Monday last, in accordance to old custom, and it would seem by the number who were drunk, that they would have saved money and time if they had remained at home."

The Oconee Courier says: "As the day waned, noise and confusion, superinduced by imbibing too freely of a liquid known hereabouts, as tangle-foot, became only too apparent. Man, it seems, is not only willing to suffer the ills he has, but will fly to those he knows not of."

The Barnwell Journal says: "Towards the close of the day many who had imbibed too freely of 'tangle-leg' and 'big gin,' were very boisterous and showed fight. Many of them were taken in out of the cold."

It would seem then, that at other places than Orangeburg, drunkenness is getting to be the characteristic of these occasions, and that the Press in other places notices and rebukes the growing evil.

If their is any disgrace, that attaches to that affair, it is that such brutal drunkenness, was exhibited in our streets, and stores and not that the ORANGEBURG NEWS noticed, and rebuked it.

May the Press ever, and every honest man, in his sober moments, hold up to rebuke and censure such scenes as were witnessed in Orangeburg on last sale-day.

Our Town Council should provide for these occasions.

The Court adjourned on Saturday until Thursday, 15th when the civil docket was taken up. Judge Carpenter has filed a decree in the case of Fickling vs Riley, in favor of the validity of the Homestead law, except in cases where the debt is secured by a lien.
