An Apology.

We apologize to our readers for the publication of the subject in our communication. That it will amuse some of them we have no doubt. The writer certainly shows himself open to the well-directed attack of our friend, "OLDSTER," in his thoughtless and silly reply. All public officers should expect the criticism of the public. Their reply to this criticism, when exercised, should be in explanation of themselves, and not in a display of malevolence all around. Our correspondent, "OLDSTER," will doubtless take care of himself next week. We have no doubt that the jury in this "Court of Justice" are intelligent men, and honest, but what, pray, have they got to do with the Trial Justice?

And now to another point. Mr. Pohl in his letter asserts in substance that there are Trial Justices who have swindled the County. As a public journalist, we demand proof of this assertion. If anybody has been playing a cheating game towards the State or County, in the capacity of Trial Justice, the public has a right to know who they are, and demand proof for conviction. And now Mr. Pohl is a sworn officer of the State, and consequently bound by said oath or obligation to protect her rights, and more especially those of the County in which he holds his appointment, it is his highest and most imperative duty to bring these parties, who have been playing a double game in the role of the Trial Justice, to condign and merited punishment. The assertion is made in no many words that somebody's course would not stand the test of the square; and as the onus probandi rests upon Mr. Pohl's shoulders, the public, to whom he has voluntarily given the intelligence, will certainly have a very curious opinion of him, unless he assists them in having these swindlers brought to the proper place. If it is at all probable that a Trial Justice who has only held his position for a few months, could have had the State indebted to him in the pretty little sum of "several thousand dollars," by "turning things to account," it is highly necessary that a rigid examination should speedily take place in this branch of our judicial department.

A word or two more and we will give the letter. It never has nor will it ever benefit a person, who gets himself into newspaper controversies, to drag others into it. As we said in the onset, replies to criticisms should always be to explain away the cause for criticism, or in exculpation of the acts of the party attacked. Wholesale insinuations and innuendoes, against parties who have no interest in a controversy, invariably serves to bring out bitterness from a quarter where it otherwise might have slept forever. We volunteer this advice for what it is worth; our experience has taught us its great value.

Here is the letter. We print it verbatim et literatim, spellatim et punctatim: BRANCHVILLE, S. C., May 29th, 1871.

Dear Editor: Permit me through your columns to reply to a communication signed Oldster, which appeared in your issue of the 20th inst. I shall endeavor to be very brief, by making a short cut, knowing if made in the right place, it will prove just as fatal. Now sir to the point; I will not consume time with this fellow, by discussing the Court of Sango Panza, for that is a subject of too much magnitude for his brain, that is if he ever had any, which is very doubtful, but for the sake of argument, let us admit that he had sum, it is then not probable that he lost what little he had at the various bars, where he says men go to settle cases. It is very evident Mr Editor that it was this cause which made my Court appear so very novel to his sense of justice, hence I am not surprised at his impertinence, being equal to his veracity. I shall therefore content myself by branding him an ass, and leave him for a while, in order to lay before the public, the very cases he refers to, commencing first with the case The State vs. Nelson Smothers; Nelson Smothers is a genteel colored man employed here as a Hotel waiter he hired a girl about thirteen years old, to take care of his child; it is said that he

beat her, and the mother of the girl a genteel woman of color entered suit in my office against him, for an Assault and Battery, there being other business in the office at the time, her case had to be necessarily deferred—for two days, and then was tried on the eighth day of May commencing at 7 o'clock P.M. E. Mikoll Carroll Esqr appearing for the defence, I would say here for this gentleman, that while he is alive to the duties of his profession, he is only resident, and not a native of these parts, and is unlike many of the new made fadgelings of the Law, who have yet to learn something of legal etiquette, and that Shakespeare done up in bombast, before a jury, is not law practice; However Mr Editor pardon me if I have digressed from the subject; I will state, that the defendant called for a jury, they were summoned, all being colored excepting Mr A. Loryen, who is an intelligent gentleman, and a Merchant of good standing in the place He acted as foreman. After the case had been heard before the Court, and the jury charged, they went to the jury room, and failed after being out, to agree. This jury was thereupon discharged and the case carried before another jury the following evening at the same hour. This jury I will particularly state, was selected from the most intelligent class of our citizens and numbered four white, and two colored, their names were as follows.—Messrs J. W. Fairry, Ewd Carr, L. C. Riggs, S. S. Turner, all white; the two colored were, Thomas Murphy, and Gabriel Fairry. After retiring they held the case under consideration for possibly two hours, and then found the Defendant, "Not Guilty," whereupon the Prisoner was discharged. Now sir take up the other case, which is as follows there came into my office a colored woman who said she wanted to prosecute a colored man, for repeatedly passing through her farm, He lives about two miles from this place I sent for him the next day, he came and so did she, I gave them a preliminary investigation, the papers were partly arranged for the case, when it suddenly comes to light, that she is half sister, or some other relation of his they looked smilingly at each other, and proposed to pay Two Dollars, half of which was paid, and they then departed better—friends than ever. This Oldster in his attempted burlesque of my Court, or in other words the Court of Branchville, would try to make it appear, that injustice was practiced, does there seem to be any of it here; had I not the power in this case, of turning it to some account provided I had followed the illustrious example of some who have been deprived of like office to the one I hold, by making this poor, ignorant, trespasser, suffer for a time in jail, in order to swindle the State out of an amount largely in excess of the Two Dollars, agreed upon by the parties themselves. Now I claim that I do not only have the honor of holding my office by right of Executive appointment, but by the wish and consent of honest, respectable, intelligent citizens of both parties, and that my official acts as well as the Docket books, in my office, are and ever will be open to public inspection as well as to that of the grand jury, which I invite at any and all times, and will add that all fines, so far received in my office for the State have been paid over, while I have not yet received one cent from it, for the State owes me but little, while if I had adopted the course of many, it would without a doubt have owed me thousands. Now sir I will stop my extravagant waste of ink on this Oldster for really I fear by his name he is either too old and feeble to stand it, or having reached his second childhood, it would be a pity to brand him a Liar.

OFFICIAL. Acts and Joint Resolutions Passed by the Legislature—Sessions 1870 and 1871.

An Act to require the County Commissioners to Report to the General Assembly.

SECTION 1. Be it Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina, now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same, That the commissioners of each county shall, on or before the fifteenth of December, in each year, report to the General Assembly all accounts chargeable to their respective counties; what have been allowed and settled; the number and amount of orders drawn upon the county treasurer; the taxes levied and collected; the amount expended for rebuilding or repairing court house, jail, poor house and bridges; in fact, a detailed account of all their doings, as required by an act entitled "an act to define the jurisdiction and duties of county commissioners," approved September 26, 1868. And upon failure so to report, they shall be fined in a sum not less than fifty, nor more than two hundred dollars.

NOTICE. OFFICE OF COUNTY SCHOOL COMMISSIONER.

To each of the CLERKS of the BOARD of SCHOOL TRUSTEES in the Various School Districts of Orangeburg County you are hereby instructed to CALL a MEETING of the Legal Voters of your respective School Districts on Saturday June 24th, 1871, at 12 o'clock M.

Notice of the time and place of such meeting to be given by the Clerk of the Board of Trustees by posting written or printed notices in three (3) public places of the School District at least ten (10) days before said meeting. Your special attention is invited to the following extracts from an Act to amend an Act entitled "An Act to establish and maintain a system of Free Common Schools for the State of South Carolina," approved March 6th, 1871: Sec. XXIX. The County Treasurer shall pay over all moneys by him received, which shall have been assured by virtue of the vote of any District meeting as hereinafter provided for, in the County in which such district is situated, on the order of the Clerk of the Board of Trustees of said District, countersigned by the County School Commissioner, to be used for the purpose directed by the District meeting so held. Said money shall be assessed and collected at the time, and in the manner that County taxes are assessed and collected; and if the inhabitants of any School District, at their annual District meeting, shall fail to provide for the raising of such tax, then the County School Commissioners of the County in which such District is situated, shall be required to withhold from said District that part of the State appropriation derived from the revenue of the State, and to apportion and distribute the same to the other Districts of the County which have complied with the requirements of this Act: Provided, That in School Districts where there are less than one hundred children between the ages of six and sixteen, the inhabitants may raise such a sum per child, as will be sufficient to maintain their schools.
