State News.

Rev. R. H. Reid is lecturing on Temperance in Spartanburg.
Two United States soldiers were flogged in Sumter Monday night, for raising a row.
There was no case tried at the criminal term of the present session of the Court at Sumter.
There is more corn planted in Barnwell county than usual, and the report of the cotton crop is fair.
The Catholic Church of Sumter, has been presented with a new organ, through the efforts of Miss Ellen Bogin.
The exhibition of the Sophomore Class of Wofford College will take place in Spartanburg on next Tuesday evening, the 4th of June.

The Marion Star says: From the most reliable information we can get, the coming political campaign will be a hot one in this county. Madam Rumor announces ninety-seven candidates for clerk of the court; one hundred and seventeen for sheriff, forty odd for judge of probate, and four hundred and forty-one for seats in the Legislature.

The following parties charged with the killing of Mr. Low, at Silver Bluff Landing last summer, were tried at Blackville on Saturday, namely: Wm. Simons, O. L. W. Smith, Peter Allen and Samuel Jenkins. These were all colored men, as was every man on the jury that tried them. Three of the parties were defended by Mr. G. W. Croft, of Aiken, and one by Mr. W. J. Whipple, of Beaufort. The jury brought in a verdict of manslaughter in the cases of the accused.

OUR COLORED FIREMEN.—The long looked for parade of the hand engines came off on Monday last. At 9 o'clock the procession formed at the Citadel Green and moved down King to Hazel and through to Meeting, down Meeting to Market and through to State street, down State to Broad, and thence pass the City Hall, where the line was reviewed by the Mayor and Aldermen. The procession kept on down Broad street to Logan, where it counter-marched, and the engines awaited their turn of running. The contest commenced a little after twelve o'clock and the following is the result of the award of prizes:

First prize, consisting of a richly chased silver pitcher, waiter and goblets, for the best time, to the Union Star.
Second prize, silver car-tor, with bell attachments, for the second best time, to the Comet Star.
Prize for the best time leaving the ground, silver goblet, to the Niagra.
Visitors' prize, consisting of pitcher, waiter and goblets, similar to those constituting the first prize, but not chased, for the best time made by a visiting company, to the Heston, of Georgetown.

Twenty two years ago, the remains of Louis Philippe, ex-King of France, were laid in English ground, in the vault of the palace-chapel at Claremont. Twenty-six years before that, Louis Philippe—then Duke of Orleans—built a chapel in the old Castle of Dreux, which he intended for a family burying-place. The improbable happened when Louis Philippe died exiled and forgotten, while the star of Prince-President Louis Bonaparte was climbing toward empire. The improbable has happened again when, as the cable tells us, President Thiers has

permitted the remains of his old master to be brought to the family vault at Dreux. The sailor son of Louis Philippe brought the body of the Great Emperor from St. Helena to Paris, over thirty years ago. The Prince de Joinville will be now called upon to assist at a less imposing pageant than that which attended the interment of the conqueror of Austerlitz; but, having already seen three revolutions, two monarchies, one empire and two republics in France, he may find matter enough for reflection as the vault at Dreux closes upon all that remains of the Citizen King.

That Street.

Whether we shall have it, is the great question of the day. There is a difference of opinion upon the subject. The Town stands divided on the momentous issue of 'street' or 'no street.' Seventy citizens have signed a petition to the Town Council, urging that honorable body to knock the project in the head. But everybody else seems to want the street, and so do we. And as petitions are generally signed as a mere matter of courtesy—and as we haven't the slightest idea that the petition in question represents the feeling of the great body of our citizens—we hope the Council will lay it gently and kindly, but very firmly, on the table.

Russell Street is the only street running through the Town to the Railroad. If it is intended that Orangeburg shall grow, we absolutely need one or more streets running parallel with Russell. Orangeburg is growing and is bound to keep on growing, unless she is so laced in at the sides and stunted at both ends as to be forced to die at the middle. We don't believe in tight lacing, or old fogyism, but we do believe in progress of all kinds.

So far as the grave yard is concerned we are inclined to think that the new street will run over the toes of more live corpses than dead ones.

In the course of an article upon the sale of delinquent lands to be made next Monday, by County Treasurer Greene, the Times remarks, with erudite reference to that gentleman: "How men, claiming to be honest, can individually, either officially or otherwise, assist in such robbery, and still claim exemption from blame is to us inexplicable."

The band are robbers from first to last in our eyes.
Mr. Greene was appointed Treasurer of this County. He has solemnly sworn to do his duty as such Treasurer. One of his duties as such Treasurer is to make the sale in question.

We deprecate the necessity resulting from the law as sincerely as any one, but we have yet to learn that the private character of a gentleman is to be assailed for no other reason than that he has honestly performed his public duties.
Mr. Greene has enforced the requirements of the Tax Law with a courtesy and a kind consideration which have won him the good will and respect of all classes and parties. His private character is spotless.

Such articles injure the Times. They are also painful to many good men. They have no other effect.

The Supplemental Treaty.

The New York Sun has the following editorial:
The supplemental treaty for the settlement of the Alabama controversy really contains nothing but the abandonment by the Government of the United States of its demand for indirect damages. This abandonment should properly be the act of the President alone. He made the demand for these indirect damages before the tribunal at Geneva without consulting the Senate, and he has the same power to withdraw it as he had to make it. There is no need for any supplemental treaty, or for going to the Senate with the subject. In short, the only purpose of this supplemental

treaty is to relieve General Grant of the responsibility of undoing his own act and retracting his own indecent blunder by putting upon the Senate the responsibility of advising and consenting to the retraction. As the demand for indirect damages was inserted in the treaty without any expectation that it would be allowed by the arbitrators, or that any money would ever be received on account of it, and as it is no longer denied that this demand was a mere piece of pettifoggery buncombe, a sham, and a humbug, so this supplemental treaty, with the ceremony of its submission to the Senate, is another piece of buncombe, another sham and humbug. If the President sees, that he virtually confesses that he does see, that the case which he presented at Geneva is bad and unjustifiable, why doesn't he withdraw it squarely and manfully, and why does he attempt to implicate the Senate in the face of this supplemental treaty?

[General Grant has in this matter followed a course sound in principle and sanctioned by precedent. Lawyers may have mistaken the law, but Grant has not mistaken the practice.—Ed News.]

The attention of the CLERKS of BOARDS of SCHOOL TRUSTEES of the various School Districts of this County, and of the School Trustees of such Districts is hereby called to Sections 29, 49, 50 and 51, of an Act entitled "An Act to amend an Act entitled 'An Act to Establish and Maintain a System of Free Common Schools for the State of South Carolina,'" approved March 6th, 1871, and especially to Sec. 49 of said Act.

The following are the Sections in question:
SECTION 29. The County Treasurer shall pay over all moneys by him received, which shall have been assessed by virtue of the vote of any district meeting as hereinafter provided for, in the County in which such District is situated, on the order of the Clerk of the Board of Trustees of said District counter-signed by the County School Commissioner, to be used for the purpose directed by this Act. Provided, That no money shall be assessed and collected at the time, and in the manner that County taxes are assessed and collected; and if the inhabitants of any School District, at their annual District meeting, shall fail to provide for the raising of such tax, then the County School Commissioner of the County in which said District is situated, shall be required to hold from said District that part of the State appropriation derived from the revenue of the State, and to apportion and distribute the same to the other Districts of the County which have complied with the requirements of this Act. Provided, That in School Districts where there are less than one hundred children between the ages of six and sixteen the inhabitants may raise such a sum, per

child, as will be sufficient to maintain their Schools.
Sec. 40. An annual meeting of each School District shall be held on the last Saturday of June, of each year, at 12 o'clock M., notice of the time and place being given by the Clerk of the Board of Trustees, by posting written or printed notices in three public places of the District at least ten days before the meeting.
Special meetings may be called by the Board of Trustees, by a majority of the legal voters of the District; but notice of such special meeting, stating the purposes for which it is called, shall be posted in at least three public places within the District, ten days previous to the time of such meeting. And no business shall be acted upon at any special meeting, not specified in said notice.
Sec. 40. The following persons shall be entitled to vote at any District meeting, viz: 1st. All persons possessing the qualifications of electors, as defined by the Constitution of this State, and who shall be residents of the District at the time of offering to vote at said meeting.
2d. The inhabitants qualified to vote at a school meeting, lawfully assembled, shall have power:

1st. To appoint a Chairman to preside over said meeting.
2d. To adjourn from time to time.
3d. To choose a Clerk, who shall possess the qualification of a voter, and who shall be chosen by ballot, in addition to the vote to their use, such further sums of money as they may deem proper for the support of public schools, said sum not to be more than three dollars for every child in the District between the ages of six and sixteen, as ascertained by the last enumeration, said sum to be collected by the County Treasurer, and to be held by him subject to the order of the Trustees, counter-signed by the County School Commissioner; such sums of money to be used as shall be directed by the meeting, either for the pay of teachers' salaries, or to purchase or lease sites for school houses; to build, hire or purchase such school houses; to keep them in repair, and furnish the same with necessary fuel and appendages; or to furnish black boards, outline maps, and apparatus for illustrating the principles of science, or to discharge any debts or liabilities lawfully incurred.
5th. To give such direction and make such provision as may be deemed necessary in relation to the presentation or defence of any suit or proceeding in which the District may be a party.
6th. To authorize the Board of Trustees to build school houses, or rent the same; to sell any school house site, or other property belonging to the District, in the same shall no longer be needed for the use of the District.
7th. To alter or repeal their proceedings, from time to time, as occasion may require, and to do any other business contemplated in this Act.
