**STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA.**

**Town of Yorkville.**  
THE Board of Health for the town of Yorkville, S. C., duly assembled, hereby make and ordain the following rule, subject to the ratification of the Town Council of said town:  
Rule.—That on and after the ratification of this rule by the town council of said town, all persons residing within the incorporate limits of said town, between the ages of 1 and 60 years, who cannot show a satisfactory scar from vaccination, be and the same are hereby required to immediately become vaccinated.  
Any person refusing to conform to the provisions of this rule, shall, on conviction before the Mayor of said town, be subject to a fine of not more than TEN DOLLARS or imprisonment not more than TEN DAYS for each refusal to so conform after request to do so from a physician or the Health Officer.  
Free vaccination shall be furnished by the town of Yorkville, S. C., to all those who refuse to pay for same.  
Done by the said Board of Health this 24th day of March, 1902.
