

COMMERCIAL WAREHOUSE RECEIPTS.

Stationer Has Established Them As Best of Collateral. Columbia State, Friday. Arrangements to finance through New York banks cotton stored in state warehouses were announced yesterday by John L. McLaughlin, warehouse commissioner, on his return from a trip to Washington and New York. He was accompanied by J. Arthur Banks, state senator for Calhoun county. "The arrangements perfectly produce the money," said Senator Banks, who told how he had borrowed \$10,000 at 5 per cent straight interest on receipts for cotton which he had stored in a state warehouse. The practical difficulty heretofore standing in the way of the warehouse system has been the financing of the cotton, but this has now been removed, it is said, so that hereafter parties who have cotton stored in the system and who desire to raise loans on their warehouse receipts can do so at a low rate of interest. Valuable assistance was rendered Mr. McLaughlin by W. P. Harding, a member of the Federal reserve board, and in New York the commissioner held satisfactory conferences with the insurance Trust company and the National City bank, of which Frank P. Vanderlip is the president. It was the Guaranty Trust company which Mr. McLaughlin procured his \$10,000 and the South Carolinians report that they believe it would have been easier to get a loan of \$10,000 of the money they say that the New York financiers are enthusiastic over the plan and will lend every assistance. Mr. McLaughlin has a proposition submitted for his acceptance, detailing a plan to overcome the difficulty presented in the fact that the money would be borrowed by so many different individuals and the bank wishes to deal with a single borrower. The suggestion is made that Mr. McLaughlin arrange with some responsible bank or financial institution in South Carolina to loan against state warehouse receipts and that he take, in connection with such loans, an agreement giving the institution selected by him the right of re-hypothecation or subrogation. Then it can send the warehouse receipts to a broker in New York with a sight draft on the New York bank, under the provisions of the New York state law recently passed, providing for acceptance of such acceptances at the rate of 1-4 per cent per annum or the rate of 1-2 per cent per annum for each 90 days. Drafts so accepted can be sold in the market at the present time at a rate of 2-1/2 per cent per annum, which makes the total cost of the money sold at 1-1/2 per cent for each 90 days, equal to 2-1/2 per cent per annum, which makes the total cost of the money sold borrowed 4 per cent. A local bank could get this money and distribute it to their customers at 6 per cent and make a profit of 2 per cent on the services and the risk assumed. "It will take some time for me to go over all these matters," said Senator McLaughlin, "and then I will make a statement; I have placed a straight loan for Senator Banks at 5 per cent straight interest which is a good deal better than the 8 per cent discount now being paid in South Carolina, and hard to get at that."
