FARMERS' ATTENTION!
FELLOW FARMERS: What price do you expect to receive for the 1918 cotton crop? What has it cost you to produce this year's crop, and what minimum price will you demand for the lint and for the seed? Will the price be to be fixed by the United States government? These and many other similar questions will be discussed by representatives of the South Carolina Cotton Marketing Organization and by the farmers themselves at the meetings to be held in York county this week.

These meetings have been called as follows: For July 10, at 10 a. m., at McConnellville; at Sharon at 3 p. m., and at Hickory Grove at 5.30 p. m.; for July 11, at York at 10 a. m.; at the Cotton Marketing Office at 3.30 p. m.; for July 12 at Rock Hill at 10 a. m., at Fort Mill at 3 p. m., and at Leslie at 5.30 p. m. The price of cotton should be stabilized and be uniform in all our markets. Should we establish a State-wide system of cotton marketing, or permit speculators on the exchange to permit to speculate on the market and fill their pockets? Come to these meetings, and by concert of action let us handle this 1918 cotton crop in a business-like manner. Producers can now absolutely control the marketing of their cotton.
