HEAD-QUARTERS.

UNION C. H., S. C., October 6, 1860.

GENERAL ORDERS No. —

Generals of Brigades respectively are required by law annually to make and transmit to the Adjutant and Inspector General, by the first day of October, a complete report of the strength of his Brigades, and the public arms, &c., in his possession.

Generals of Brigades, who have failed to comply with this law, are hereby required to make such report by the first day of November proximo.

Generals of Brigades are, by law, responsible for the organization and discipline of their respective Brigades, and it is incumbent upon each one of them to require their Colonels to discharge their duties; therefore, no incomplete report will be accepted from a General of Brigade, unless it is accompanied with a statement that each defaulting Colonel has been arrested, and has been or will be court-martialed.

It is at all times of consequence that the Command-in-Chief and the Legislature shall have information in reference to the affairs of the State; it may be of vast importance that the next Legislature have information as to the exact strength and condition of each Regiment and Corps in the State. It is therefore, hoped that each General of Brigade will use his utmost effort to procure the information so much desired.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.
COLUMBIA, S. C., Oct. 12, 1860.

By His Excellency WILLIAM H. GIST, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the State of South Carolina.

WHEREAS Electors of President and Vice President of the United States are appointed by the General Assembly of South Carolina; and whereas an Act of Congress, passed in 1846, fixed the time when these Electors shall be appointed on the time when these Electors of this State is not in regular session. In consequence thereof, I, WILLIAM H. GIST, in the exercise of the authority conferred by the Constitution to convene the Legislature on extraordinary occasions, do issue this proclamation, calling upon those Senators of the General Assembly whose terms of office have not expired, and those who have been now recently elected, and the members of the House of Representatives who have been now recently elected, to convene at Columbia on the FIRST MONDAY IN NOVEMBER NEXT, that they may be present, on the Tuesday following, in conformity to the Act of Congress above referred to; and also that they may, if advisable, take action for the safety and protection of the State.

Given under my hand and the seal of the State, at Columbia, on the twelfth day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty.
