Mr. Pinson has filled the position for a number of years, and was recommended to the Governor by a number of the citizens of Williamston, and his appointment will be a great convenience to the people of that portion of our County.

The Hon. Path. Democratic Club meets on the next Saturday, the 12th inst., at 2 o'clock p. m. Messrs. John B. Moore, W. D. Evans and E. B. Murray are invited to address the meeting, and Gen. Humphreys will be present for the purpose of forming a cavalry company. The citizens generally are invited to attend.

We are requested to announce that the Pendleton Democratic Club will meet on next Saturday, 12th inst., at 11 o'clock a. m., in Music Hall. The Hon. R. W. Simpson will address the Club upon the issues of the present campaign, and a full attendance of the members of the Club, together with the citizens generally, are invited to attend.

Mr. J. B. Simpson, of the firm of Simpson, Reid & Co., has the most forward garden in Anderson. On the first day of April he gathered full grown green peas, and all other vegetables are advanced in the same proportion. He has no doubt also the finest patch of wheat in the County. It stands thick and over two feet high on the ground.

Mr. John Adams, a young man living upon the plantation of J. L. Bryant, Esq., met with the misfortune on Wednesday, the 3rd inst., to have his house and all of his household furniture and other property destroyed by fire while he and his family were absent from the house at work. The cause of the burning is unknown, as the house was thoroughly in flames before it was discovered. Mr. Adams has the sympathy of the whole community in his misfortune.

Friday, the 19th inst., will be Good Friday, and the Sunday following will be Easter. This is commonly spoken of by old persons as the gardening season, and with it begins the settled Spring. These occasions come very late this year, and to all appearances the Spring has preceded them by several weeks. It may be, however, that cold spells are to come yet, and that the soil will still hold good, despite present appearances. Indeed, some weather prophets are predicting cold weather in this month and May. If their prediction is verified the season will be a very disastrous one, so far as fruits, vegetables, &c., are concerned.

J. H. Vermillion, who was arrested here by Col. W. H. Brown some weeks ago, was tried in Greenville last week for killing his wife, Mrs. Holliday, in a quarrel at a whiskey wagon near Cooley's bridge about four years ago. The case was represented by Col. W. H. Perry and J. S. Cochran, while the defense was conducted by General McGowan and Judge Reed. Both the prosecution and the defense were vigorous and able, and the jury returned a verdict of guilty of manslaughter, with a recommendation to mercy. The Judge sentenced Vermillion to two years' imprisonment in the State Penitentiary, the least sentence which the law allows. It is thought that a strong effort will be made to secure a pardon for the prisoner, as he has a great deal of sympathy expressed for him by the people of the surrounding country.

Anderson Democratic Club held its regular meeting on last Friday evening. After the transaction of a small amount of unimportant business, Col. E. M. Rucker was called for, who responded in a brief but enthusiastic speech, in which he said that he believed the Republicans North would do all in their power at the coming election to secure in South Carolina a Republican Senate and House of Representatives, in order to secure a Republican successor to John J. Fetterison in the United States Senate, and also to place in their hands the election machinery of the State for 1880, so that our vote in the Electoral College may be given to the Republican nominee for President. He urged the Democracy to be united in their support of the nominees of the party for the Senate and House of Representatives. Maj. E. P. Whitner was elected to address the Club at its regular meeting in May.

A VALUABLE COW.

We are indebted to Mr. J. C. Keys for a statement of the yield from one cow kept by him for the last ninety days, and give it as a matter of information to our readers, with the hope that it may tend to induce them to take care of their milk cows, and receive similar profit. The following is the average per day:

1st 30 days, 36 lbs. or pints per day. 2d 30 days, 34 lbs. or pints per day. 3d 30 days, 37 lbs. or pints per day. or for the first 90 days she gave 41 gallons per day; the next 30 days she gave a fraction over 44 gallons per day; and the third 30 days she gave 4 gallons and five pints per day. During fourteen days of this time she averaged 5 gallons per day, and on one day she gave 6 1/2 gallons. The total amount of milk given in the 90 days was 418 gallons and 1 pint. From this amount of milk 137 pounds of butter was made. The cow is half Durham, of medium size, and weighs 644 pounds live weight. She has been giving milk since the 1st day of June, 1875, with the exception of a short interval last year, and still holds up in the quantity of milk she yields. This shows the advantage of keeping one cow properly, instead of half a dozen or so in the ordinary way.

YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION CONVENTION.

The Executive Committee of the Y. M. C. A. in South Carolina has issued a circular relative to the third annual reunion, which will take place on April 25th in Sumter, continuing in session three days. There is a great deal of interest in the coming convention, and the Secretary of the Executive Committee has been receiving inquiries the past few weeks from almost all over the State relative to it. The discussions of such questions as: How to reach young men, create an interest in Bible study, and push forward the State work, together with kindred subjects, will occupy some of the time of the convention. Bible readings will be given, and praise, promise and open air meetings will be held. The coming annual meeting promises to be the largest one ever held in the State. Arrangements are being made with the different railroad companies to allow delegates to travel at the usual reduced rates. The Christian people of Sumter will entertain the members of the convention, and Mr. W. P. Smith, of that town is the chairman of the committee on hospitality.

EXCURSION TO CHARLESTON.

A grand excursion has been arranged for Charleston over all the railroads in the State to carry persons to that city during the Easter festival, at which time the Floral Fair will also take place. The State Press Association, the Grand Division Sons of Temperance, the Grand Lodge of Good Templars, and other interesting meetings will also be in session during this time. The sale of tickets will begin on the 19th and continue to Tuesday, the 23rd inst., and will be good to return at any time within ten days from the day on which they are purchased. The fare from Pendleton will be \$9.50; from Anderson, Williamston and Belton, \$9, and from Hones Path, \$8.75. There will no doubt be a very large gathering in Charleston of citizens from all parts of the State.

GRAND CONCERT.

There will be given in Masonic Hall in Anderson a Grand Oratorio Concert on the evening of Friday the 12th inst., at 8 o'clock, under the direction of Prof. W. H. Evans. The entertainment will consist of a choice selection of solos, duets and choruses, which will be a treat to all lovers of good music. The entertainment is given for the benefit of the Baptist Parsonage fund, and we hope it will be liberally patronized. The price of admission will be 50 cents, or three tickets for one dollar.

HONRA PATZ.

The Democratic Club will meet at this place on Saturday afternoon next. Speakers have been invited to address the Club at that time. Gen. Humphreys will be here also to organize a Cavalry Company. Turn out, everybody, and get warmed up for the coming campaign. The colored people are invited to attend. Major McCullough is getting up an Infantry Company, and is attached to Gen. Hemphill's Brigade. Rev. Nathaniel Gaines, aged about 85 years, walked from his home to this place, a distance of some six miles, to contribute to the purchase of the horse given to Governor Hampton. ... R. Lewis Moorhead, of Greenville, has some sort of heart disease, and has gone over to Lowndesville for treatment. ... If the great European war don't take place, and cotton is worth twenty-five cents per pound next fall, our people will have lots of money, but if the "Britishers" and Russians, and all other nations on the other side, get squarely down to fighting cotton, our folks won't have money enough to buy meat and bread to do them until the 30th January, 1879. ... Farm work is progressing favorably in this section.

LEBANON.

Lebanon Church will meet in conference on Saturday next, and important business will be transacted. On Sunday morning there will be a "Praise Meeting." The Church is active in missionary work, and is endeavoring to impress all with its importance. ... Harper Grange meets regularly every Saturday before the second Sabbath of each month at 9 o'clock a. m. ... Farmers are busy preparing for their crops. There will be a larger cotton crop than usual this year. ... We have a quiet time now, as our stock is all up, and milk and butter are plentiful.

HEADQUARTERS 11TH BRIGADE CAVALRY, ANDERSON C. H., 3 C., April 8, 1878. Special Order No. 1.

I. The Cavalry Companies of Anderson County will proceed to organize two Regiments of Cavalry on the 27th of April inst., by the election of one Colonel, one Lieutenant-Colonel and one Major for each Regiment.

II. One Regiment to be composed of the Companies commanded by Captains Tribble, Moore, Dacus, Snipes, Cox, Vandiver, Robinson and Guyton.

III. The other Regiment will comprise the Companies commanded by Captains Bryan, Beatty, Drake and D. C. McConner, Kidd, Garrison and Eskew.

IV. The following named persons are appointed Managers of Election, and before entering upon the discharge of their duties shall take and subscribe an oath faithfully to discharge to the best of their abilities the duties thereof, to wit:

Notice of S. Internal Revenue Special Taxes.

UNDER the Revised Statutes of the United States, Sections 3222, 3227, 3228, and 3229, every person engaged in any business, avocation, or employment, which renders him liable to a special tax, is required to procure and keep conspicuous in his establishment, or place of business, a true and correct copy of the said Statute denoting the place and kind of special tax for the special tax year beginning May 1, 1878. Section 3224, Revised Statutes, designates who are liable to special tax. A return, as prescribed on Form 11, is also required by law of every person liable to special tax above. Severe penalties are prescribed for non-compliance with the foregoing requirements, or for continuing in business after April 30, 1878, without payment of tax. Application should be made to E. B.
