The ferry on Savannah River, formerly known as Hank's Ferry, which was purchased by the Town Council of Anderson, is now available free to all persons coming to Anderson with cotton or other produce from Georgia and returning home, has recently been furnished with a new flat of large size and excellent construction. It is the best, or as good a ferry as can be found on the river, and by it the road to Hartwell is from a mile to a mile and a half shorter, and equally as good as can be found on any other route. The little old flat which was brought over five hundred bales of cotton to Anderson last season, and with the new facilities the merchants may expect an increased influx of Georgia cotton during the coming year. Be kind enough to allow space in your paper, which has so large a circulation among us here, for a few local items. Our place is improving somewhat. Mr. A. P. Shirley has just completed a new barn, on the modern plan, a number of outbuildings, and has erected the most comfortable and attractive residence for himself in Home Path. His place looks like a little villa. One new firm in town—Mr. M. T. Elgin, dealer in family groceries. Trade is better than last season. Already over 500 tons of fertilizers sold here, and the cry is still for more. A few hens are being given, but most of them for small amounts. People will get out of debt and be ahead in another year or so of retrenchment. Prof. H. G. Reed has the most flourishing school he has had for the past four years of his successful teaching at this place. Some parties, loose in their ideas of means and ends, were bold enough to break into Prof. Reed's school house on Saturday night and appropriate his clock, a lot of books and other valuables. The June meeting of the Third Union District of the Saluda Baptist Association will be held at Cross Roads Church. Howard Brooks, colored, was caught last week and sent to Anderson jail for creating a disturbance at a colored religious meeting last August. He had eluded arrest meanwhile by staying in Georgia. At 11 o'clock Saturday night a large meteor shot across the Southern sky and exploded near the horizon. The light occasioned by the transit was exceedingly brilliant. Dr. D. S. Watson, one of the delegates to the Union Meeting, expressed himself as much pleased with the general appearance of the Fork country, and particularly with Townville and its people.
