The Supreme Court admitted fifteen young men to the practice of law on Monday last, among whom were Messrs. J. S. Murray, Jr., and Columbus Wardlaw, of Anderson.

Several rallies were interrupted the other day by notices from the police to the parties getting them up that there was an Ordinance in force against raffling and other species of gambling.

Alf McFee, a colored man who was employed at the depot at this place for ten or twelve years past, mysteriously disappeared one day last week and has not been heard of since.

A typographical error last week made us overstate the difference in the amount of cotton received at this place and Abbeville, instead of having 5,000 bales more than Abbeville, we have about 3,000.

The blindeggers, a most fatal disease to horses and mules, is spreading to a considerable extent in this County, and a good many of our farmers have lost valuable animals during the past few weeks. This County is one of the best organized in the State, and was ably represented at the State meeting by Messrs. J. W. Norris, D. K. Norris, W. W. Russell, J. H. Watson, P. R. Brown and J. L. Glenn. We regret our inability to present a full account of the proceedings of the meeting.

The Public Schools of Anderson County are the best conducted of any in the State. Mr. R. W. Todd, our efficient and popular Commissioner, to whose good judgment and excellent management their efficiency is largely due, has furnished us the following information from his office, which will be found of interest: Number of schools in the County, 108, kept open on an average of six months; number of white teachers, 71, of which 35 were males and 36 females; number colored teachers, 29, of which 21 were males and 8 females—making a total of 110 teachers in all. Number of white pupils, 2,729, of which 1,497 were males and 1,232 females; number colored pupils, 2,077, of which 992 were males and 1,085 females—making a total of 4,806. The teachers were paid on an average of \$23.03 per month. The whole amount of money disbursed during the year was \$10,321.43, about three hundred dollars of which were applied to the extinguishment of old debts. There is still money in the County Treasury to the credit of the school fund.

The Public School Teachers' Salaries. In obedience to a call of the School Commissioners, a number of Trustees met on Monday, 1st of November last, but as there was not a quorum present there was no formal organization. The following resolutions were suggested, however, and endorsed by those present and recommended to the local boards not represented in the meeting, in order to secure uniformity in disbursing the public money:

Resolved, That where schools average 25 pupils or more, we will allow the first grade teacher \$25, second grade \$20 and third grade \$17 per month. Such schools as average less than twenty-five pupils we will allow three, four and five cents per diem, according to grade. Resolved, That when schools are made up of pupils from two or more school districts, teachers will be required to report to each board of trustees the entire number of pupils in their school, designating from what school district they come, and each board of trustees will allow the pro rata share of teacher's salary, as specified in first resolution. The resolutions are good ones, and if the trustees of all the school districts would adopt and carry them out strictly, the public school system of the County would be still further improved and perfected.
