ELECTRIC GROWTH.

Some of the Mills at Columbia, Anderson and Pelzer Operated by the Electric Power.

The Southern Field, published by the Southern Railroad and edited by M. V. Richards, is a journal wide-awake to the interests of the South.

In the South, along the lines of the Southern Railway, are very many fine water powers, and several have been improved and are in use in city lighting on street cars lines and in factories.

The Columbia power is the largest of the three, the developed horse power being 1,000, giving it a great superiority. There is at Holyoke, Lowell or Lawrence, Mass., Manchester, N. H., or Lewiston, Me. The Broad river and the Saluda river above Columbia unite to form the Congaree. The rapids of the Broad begin two miles above the city, and terminate one mile below, falling in this distance forty-one feet.
