

A rest from politics is now in order and we believe will be appreciated by the good people of the State.

According to the Columbia correspondent of the News and Courier the next House of Representatives will be composed of 90 prohibitionists, 40 opposed to both dispensary and prohibition and 11 favoring the dispensary.

Secretary Alger has been heard to say more than once, in private conversation, that if he gets out alive from his administration of the war office he will be happy. The secretary is evidently afraid that the charges made against him may prove fatal.

The News and Courier published its annual trade review of Charleston last Saturday, and, as usual, it was full of interesting facts and statistics. In many departments of trade the review shows an increase over former years. Charleston should be proud of the showing made in this excellent publication.

One of the Democratic papers in New York estimates that the next Congress will stand as follows: "Protections, 167; Republicans, 129; Fusion, 26, and doubtful 32. This estimate gives the Democrats a majority of 38 over the Republicans. In the recent State elections the Democrats have made big gains, even in Maine and Vermont.

Miss Winnie Davis, "Daughter of the Confederacy," died at Narragansett Pier, R. I., last Sunday afternoon, and the announcement of her death has caused a feeling of sadness throughout the South. She was a noble young woman and made friends wherever she was known. The grief-stricken mother has the sympathy of our whole country.

Scandals in the War Department but emphasize the evils of a great standing army. If corruption and incompetence flourish at the expense of our soldiers while they are fighting a foreign foe, it is reasonable to suppose that in times of peace fraud and mismanagement might be the chief occupation of the department.

With the settlement of the peace conditions, provision for the construction of the Nicaragua canal should be made by Congress without delay. The south is vitally interested in this enterprise. The position the United States has acquired in the East will open up a vast market for cotton and iron, besides new fields for development.

The committee on pensions reported at the recent encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic that the death rate among the pensioners now exceeded 40,000 a year. The committee estimated that the increase in the number of deaths will be such that in 1920 the number of pensioners will be reduced to a little over 250,000 and that in 1940 the list will be obliterated.

Sir Thomas Tannered, representing an English syndicate which proposes to take hold of the Black Diamond Railroad system, has arrived in Cincinnati, where he was met by Hon. Wm. Kirby, president of the system. These two gentlemen will go over the proposed route at once. You may just put it down that Mr. Tannered will make a favorable report to the syndicate and that the Black Diamond Railroad will be built.

Do you love your town? If so you will help support and maintain its business institutions. Do you have any concern for its future? If so, you will encourage every movement looking to the up-building of the town. Would you like to see it grow and prosper and extend its trade and influence? If so, you will speak a good word for the town and people at every opportunity. You will lend assistance to its industries and patronize them. If you don't do these things you are a poor citizen, only a stumbling block to prosperity, and a positive detriment to any community.

Inasmuch as Charleston is being very harshly criticized for polling in the recent primary less than one-third of her voting strength, we publish the following clipping from an editorial of the News and Courier, under date of 14th instant, which fully explains the light vote: "The vote in Charleston was not nearly as large as our friends in the country expected, nor nearly as large as it would have been but for the restrictions which have been placed upon the suffrage in this city. The law requires that voters at the primary in Charleston shall not only possess registration certificates entitling him to vote at general elections, but that they also present receipts showing that they have paid their poll tax; more than that, the law requires that they must have paid their poll tax six months before the primary election. They are compelled, in addition, to be regularly enlisted members of a Democratic club. Such conditions are not required in any other county in the State. They were imposed upon this community without regard for the broader political interests of the community, and because our hands have been tied and our true voting strength suppressed in party elections we rest under the charge of indifference to our friends throughout the State."
