RAILROAD IRON.—Three cargoes of this important article has arrived here within a few days, consigned to the South Carolina Railroad Company. We trust that this is an indication that they intend to push their railroad connections through to Columbia and Augusta with all the force that they can command. Freight, in large quantities, is at Augusta awaiting transportation, and cannot be got away, owing to the low stage of the Savannah River and the breaking up of railroad communication with the seaboard. Some light draft boats, on the Savannah, are getting enormous freights. The transportation facilities to the upper portion of our own State are exceedingly bad, and passengers and freight are subject to great expense and loss of time in having to resort to the old wagon system. We cannot have any mail facilities until the railroad connections are made; and as the Government has contracted to have the mails transported through Carolina, we presume they are only waiting for our roads to be connected to give us a daily mail.

The Savannah Daily Herald, of Saturday last, in its commercial column, says:

The resumption of railway travel between Savannah and Augusta, as also the forwarding of goods by the road, will greatly relieve our merchants. On Monday morning next the trains by the Central Railroad will connect at Station 44 with tracks running to Waynesboro', and thence to Augusta by the Augusta and Savannah Railroad. Savannah and Augusta, by this arrangement, are brought within twenty-two hours' travel.

Gov. Pierpont, of Va., has sent McMillen, a member of the Southern Congress, a delegate to Washington to get negro troops removed from Virginia. No movement has been made in that direction by the War Department.

A number of Northern capitalists have taken hold of the James River and Kanawha Canal, and intend to have that important artery of trade open for business in time to bring to market the coming crops of the region of country tributary to it.

A Richmond correspondent of the New York Tribune says that General Terry was openly insulted by being hissed, while riding through the streets a few days since.
