THE MAILS.—We have had recently many complaints of great irregularity in the mails along the line of the Cheraw and Darlington and the Wilmington and Manchester Railroads, and in an interview, on yesterday, with the courteous Assistant Postmaster, we were assured that the mails are regularly made up and properly forwarded to their different destinations. We sincerely hope that the temporary postmasters at the stations, as well as mail agents on the routes, will endeavor to assist the officers here in the distribution of the mails, as without their helping hand the efforts of this office will be useless. We, therefore, respectfully ask all who are in any way connected with the mails to be vigilant and accommodating, so that harmony may exist in the great system of communication which is now just about assuming a shape in the South.

THE FOLLOWING letter from the Hon. Secretary of the Treasury to one of our prominent citizens will show that it is the purpose of the Government to have all abandoned furniture, books, &c., returned to their owners:

TREASURY DEPARTMENT, Sept. 15, 1865. Sir: I have received your letter, under date of July 28th last, in relation to the release of certain property, &c.

The several Supervising Agents of this Department have been instructed to restore to loyal owners, and those who have availed themselves of the benefits of the President's Proclamation of Amnesty, and who are not excepted therefrom, or who have obtained from him a special pardon, any articles of household furniture, books, or personal or family relics which may be in their possession, on certain conditions.

If the articles referred to are in the possession of Agents of this Department at Charleston, you should apply to Supervising Special Agent Callicut for their release.
