COLUMBIA, October 25.—Both Houses met to-day at the College Chapel, and Col. F. J. MOSES was elected President pro tem, and General W. E. MARTIN Clerk of the Senate.

The House elected Hon. A. P. ALDRICH Speaker, and J. T. SLOAN Clerk.

Mr. SIMONSON gave notice of a bill for fixing the election for Members of Congress.

CINCINNATI, October 25.—The colored people of Indiana met in Convention at Indianapolis yesterday; one hundred and fifty delegates present.

A Convention of grain dealers of the Western market, was held on the 22d proximo, to break down the excessive rates now charged on grain shipments East.

**The Elections.**  
Col. F. J. MOSES has been elected to the Senate from Sumner, without opposition, and Messrs. A. A. GILBERT, J. T. GREEN, and J. S. RICHARDSON, to the House of Representatives.

Gen. J. B. KERSHAW has been elected Senator, and Messrs. W. Z. LEITNER and W. L. DEPASS Representatives from Kershaw District, without opposition.

COUNSEL FROM AN OLD MAN.—Concluding a speech in relation to negro equality, the Rev. Dr. BRECKINRIDGE says:

"That any State, left to itself, will ever bestow suffrage on a mass of slaves of a different race, suddenly set free by a paramount authority, and nearly equal in number to the rest of its inhabitants, is an event that will hardly be witnessed in this world. That in any State where slavery never existed, or where it has long ceased to exist, a white race, both cultivated and predominant, will ever give suffrage of its own accord to a black race resident with it, equal to itself in number and greatly beneath it in civilization, is an event contrary to the common judgment of mankind, and wholly improbable in itself. Nor if the relative position of the parties was exactly reversed, would the result be different. Because the instincts of mankind are more permanent by far than the caprices of enthusiasm, and wiser by far than the extreme conclusions of delusive theories or of party spirit. Secured in the great gift of freedom, protected in the rights of person and the rights of property, four millions of slaves of a different race will have rooted, if not continued to smother, our endeavors—an instalment of blessings indefinitely rich. Let these blessings be enjoyed and improved, not wasted and risked in the agitation of demands which have no foundation in reason, in experience, or in public necessity, and which are attended with many perils and no hope of true success."

RAILROADS AND THE MATRONS.—We are gratified to learn from Mr. John B. Erwin, the President of the King's Mountain Railroad Company, that on and after Monday next there will be a daily train run over his road, from and to Guthrieville, seven miles below Yorkville. He informs us that through the indefatigable energy of Mr. Edward Thomas, the Superintendent, the rolling stock which has so long blocked up the lower end of the road has been removed, so that trains can now be run through to the Chester depot. Arrangements have also been perfected for furnishing our citizens with a daily mail.—Yorkville Enquirer.
