While determined to be German and to remain an integral part of that country, they are equally determined to preserve their own identity or nationality intact, and will cast their suffrages for the Duke of Augustenburg (the protege of Austria) as their sovereign.

News Summary.

Eight hundred and sixty thousand dollars have been subscribed toward the Knoxville and Cincinnati Railroad. Throckmorton, the conservative candidate for Governor of Texas, received a large majority in Galveston on Monday at the election, and will most probably be elected. The Union Bank of Tennessee has acknowledged the validity of Confederate obligations, and the rebel debts in that community are being paid in currency.

Since writing that article we have received a letter from a gentleman of this State, now in Washington, in which he says that in the Intelligencer, of June 29, there is an article stating that the National Union Convention will not tolerate men who have been disunionists. He says further, that this statement is no doubt by authority.

We regret to be compelled to believe that such should be the fact. And we hope that the friends of the Union, both North and South, should still elect delegates to the Philadelphia Convention, as they are certainly entitled to do under the call, unless it is further explained. Let the representatives of all the conservative elements of the nation meet in Philadelphia, and then if the South is excluded from participation in that national assembly, the men of the North will do it with their eyes open, and be responsible for all the consequences.

THE WAR BEGUN.

Although we have no news as yet of any armed encounter of the hostile troops, and the roar of the opening cannon has not yet crossed the seas, war has been declared in Germany; the armies of the Confederation are being mobilized; the Prussian troops have entered Holstein, and still later have marched into Saxony and Hanover. There are rumors also about an engagement near Leipzig, but this lacks confirmation.

We did not share those hopes. Bismark, who controls the destinies of Prussia, knew how unpopular his course has been at home. At least it is to be supposed that he is conscious of the odium in which he stands among his people, when he found it necessary to turn the members of the House of Commons out of doors, and shut up the Chamber. We know also, that an attempt at his life has recently been made by a young enthusiast; and that peace petitions come flocking in to the King, even to this day, from every city, town and hamlet of the kingdom.

Bismark appealed to the people of Germany, i. e., he proposed a German Parliament, members of which were to be elected by universal suffrage;—a general convention, by our nomenclature,—an extra-constitutional assembly. We cannot think that the Prussian Premier entertained any hopes of securing the approbation of such a body; or that he seriously intended respecting its decision, if adverse to his policy.

The German Diet has met, and by a considerable majority declared in favor of Austria. Prussia, therefore, now stands arrayed against all Germany,—from twenty-five to thirty millions of her natural allies; and this, too, as we have seen, at a time when the King's government is most unpopular all through his own dominions. The casus belli is so trivial, so manifestly unjust, that we cannot be surprised at the course the minor German States have adopted. Prussia goes to war purely for territorial aggrandizement,—which has long since ceased to be a just and

But grant that all this enthusiasm is genuine, and further, that the quarrel of the Italian is a just one,—i. e., that the people of Venetia have a right to determine who shall rule them; and that in this lies the great strength of Italy as an ally. If this be so, then Prussia must be singularly weak, morally and materially,—for in her case we have the reverse of all this. She has no "legitimate" title to Holstein, and we have already shown the determined and persistent opposition the people of those Duchies manifest against being gobbled up by Bismark's greedy maw.
