YELLOW FEVER.

We have no faith in the predictions which some would-be seers are so fond of making, in respect to the advent of yellow fever. The wisest and most prudent of those of the Faculty, whose opportunities and studies warrant them in giving an authoritative opinion, are usually most chary of such predictions.

One thing, however, is certain. Our city, every summer, is more or less liable to this epidemic. We should, therefore, always take such precautions as may ward off or mitigate its ravages.

Immediately at our hands, and all around us, is abundant work. Each one of us may contribute his quota to promote the efficiency of those sanitary measures, concerning the benefit of which there is very little doubt.

It becomes the plain duty, then, of every citizen to pay rigid attention to the well recognized principles of cleanliness, both of person and premises. The care of the streets and drains we may entrust to our efficient and ever-vigilant City Fathers, making it our duty to assist them by promptly reporting any remissness on the part of subordinates.

Under these circumstances, then, it behooves all parties to exercise the utmost vigilance and care in a rigid enforcement of all proper hygienic measures.

Even if yellow fever does not so much as threaten us, these precautions are eminently proper, as they may prove equally efficient in warding off other forms of disease incident to this season and climate.

THE ARGUMENT OF THE RADICALS.

The best evidence of the exasperation and abgrin of the Radicals at the success of the President's policy is to be found in the libelous statements of the representative organs of that party. For instance, one among the most prominent paragraphs in the New York Tribune of a late issue is the following:

"A little colored girl in Richmond was severely beaten by a white man. The mother applied to ex-Mayor Saunders, now a magistrate, for a warrant. He replied, 'I am not in any humor for giving warrants. You must go away from here.'"

When it is known that ex-Mayor SAUNDERS is now a member of the City Council of Richmond, and not a magistrate, and, therefore, has no right to issue warrants, the absurdity of the Tribune's paragraph becomes apparent. Newspapers, however, are like individuals. They are curious. Notwithstanding, however, this libel of the Tribune, and its naming the recent disgraceful riots in New Orleans a "Rebel attack upon loyalists," it endorses and compliments the Augusta Constitutionalist on that paper's "patriotic" course in regard to the Philadelphia National Convention. How is this?

A New Haven (Connecticut) paper—the Palladium—recently regaled its readers with a long editorial upon "Education for Freedmen," and thinks, in view of the fact that the Freedmen's Bureau will finally be abolished, "the work of educating the South must be pushed forward as rapidly as possible while some degree of protection exists."

Talk as much as you please, Mr. Radical Editor, but for the honor of the profession don't make yourself so ridiculous another time.

The latest news from London, received by the Atlantic Cable, is to the effect that a treaty was signed at Vienna on the 27th by the Sovereigns of Prussia, Austria, Bavaria and Hesse Darmstadt, and the representatives of France, Italy, Spain, Russia, Portugal, Great Britain, Turkey and the German States. It is a compact securing a lasting peace throughout Europe. Prussia is to have sole dominion in the German States, excepting Hungary, Bavaria and the Danubian Principalities (?) King WILHELM is to be made Emperor of Germany. Italy is to have Venetia and three fortresses of the Quadrilateral. An armistice of four weeks had previously been agreed upon by Austria, Prussia, Bavaria and the other German powers.
