VARIOUS ITEMS.

The Louisiana cotton crop is promising. The late storm in Connecticut was hard on the tobacco. A handsome young gent at Newport lately announced himself as "on the make" - he meant to make love. England and America are now anchored by the same cable. Mr. Quill, in his observations of society, discovers that a foundryman is very careful not to lose caste. Gen. Grant will wear two stars and a metallic shield as an insignia of rank. The two best items of news this week - the cable and the adjournment of Congress. Men who fight duels have two seconds to live after they are dead. - Ex. A prize-fighting party from the American side caused the last Canadian scare. But four regular theatres are open in New York, and two of these are said to be closing. Victoria, the Sandwich Island princess, died from the effects of imprudently bathing white heated. It is said gambling has become respectable at Saratoga. It is said the immense quantities of mutilated currency destroyed has caused a scarcity of the article. The Southern Pacific Railroad is open to Marshall, Texas. A man had a trained Russian blood-hound stolen from him in New York, valued at \$500. A London paper expresses regret at the humiliation of Austria - "it was such a gentlemanly old Empire." A coal area of over 26,000 square miles is said to exist in the northern and western parts of Missouri. The King of Hanover sent a little nest egg to London - 1,200,000 thalers. The International Hotel in New York - Taylor's - sold for \$450,000. Most of the jokes upon the needle gun are only new ones. - Wash. Repub. A soldier with artificial legs recently declared that he had rather be "on his last legs" than his new ones. The only way some people can get anything into their heads is by taking a drink or riding in sleeping cars. Mr. Jackson, member of the Tennessee Legislature, has brought a suit for \$100,000 against the Radical members of the House for false imprisonment. The Japanese Government will hereafter permit its subjects to go beyond the seas and learn any art, science or trade. Bud Hammond was held by a negro woman in Atlanta, Ga., while her son cut his (Bud's) throat. There had been "a dispute." A Cincinnati student presented his teacher with a severe thrashing because the latter tendered his little bill for payment. The Indians have been making raids upon the Mormons at the Valley, killing the brethren and running off their horses, and the brethren and running off their horses. The Navy Department has just been advised out of \$50,000 by forged requisitions. The forger was very gentlemanlike in his appearance, and has not since been heard from. Julia Dean closed at Salt Lake Theatre on the 6th ult. with a little speech, in which she expressed a wish that the "same purity" which reigned in the theatre there prevailed in every temple of the drama. It seems there are some sinners among the Salt Lake Saints, as, on a recent Sunday, Brigham Young took occasion to rebuke the "spirits of worldliness" manifested by many of his people. Du Chailu, it seems, has had a hard time during his last visit to Africa. He was confined to one place for five months with small-pox, and was afterwards twice wounded with poisoned arrows by the natives. It is said that the king of the Sandwich Islands has a decided antipathy to everything American. He was called a "nigger" while traveling in this country some years since, and has never forgiven the affront. A young man of 19, at Dover, Del. being way-laid by two desperadoes, crushed the skull of one with a blow from his rifle, and buried his dagger to the hilt in the bosom of the other, at the same time receiving several wounds himself, having his hat shot from his head, and his hunting shirt literally cut out from his body. Sonr Lake must be a remarkable place, according to the correspondence of a Texas paper. The waters not only cure rheumatism, but also, it is said, emit a gas with which it is contemplated to fight the neighborhood. A stove funnel, into the end of which a tube had been inserted, having been placed over the water where the gas escaped, and a lighted match applied, a jet of flame was emitted which burned as brightly as a kerosene lamp. In the present critical state of European affairs the town of Bremen trembles for its celebrated Rosenwein, of which one single bottle is worth 2,750,000 rix thalers, or 10,000,000 fr., which makes the price of a glass 1,400,000 fr., or 1400 fr. per drop. Do not imagine, says the German journal which tells the story, that this calculation has emanated from the brain of a fanatic; it is founded on the following fact: A case of the German wine, containing 204 bottles, was valued in 1621, a period at which this wine was made, at 1300 fr. (24s.). If you reckon the expense of keeping the case, the taxes paid thereon, and the interest of the original sum, the price of one of these cases now amounts to 600,000 rix thalers, therefore a single bottle is worth 2,750,000 rix thalers. A Paris letter of July 3d thus alludes to a recent royal entertainment: "The Empress offered to her late sovereign guest, the Grand Duchess Maria of Russia, as a parting compliment, a magnificent fête in the fairy-like palace of the Elysees, which has been of late refitted, embellished and adorned under the auspices of her Majesty. The entertainment consisted of a dinner of thirty covers and of an evening reception comprising only the elite of the court circle. The grounds were one blaze of illumination and electric lights, throwing a noon-day splendor over the spacious avenues, garreted of exotic flowers and sparkling fountains, among which the line of dignitaries and gentle dames wandered and enjoyed the fine music of bands and of vocal performers, the latter all pupils of the Conservatoire. The toilettes paraded of the sylvan character of the festive scene, floating gauze robes instead of crapes, decorations of garlands and wreaths of natural flowers, replaced sparkling gems and gorgeous bracelets. In view of the German war and the unmitigated knocking of principalities into cocked hats, the Pall Mall Gazette asks where are the kings, the queens, the princes and the princesses of the rest of Europe to find a sufficiency of eligible candidates for their hands as wives and husbands? Already the supply is barely equal to the demand, and with the now-fangled notions about our "common flesh and blood," as applied to our princesses and working men, it is hard to imagine what will be the consequences of a large diminution in the number of German royalties. At the present time there are hardly any sovereigns in Europe in which a German prince or princess is not either king or queen, or father-in-law or mother-in-law, or married to the heir apparent or the heir prospective to the crown. It has hitherto, indeed, been the mission of Germany to supply Europe with theology, classical dictionaries, royal wives; and what is to happen when a dozen more thrones are abolished it is difficult to see. When the various Coburgs, who judiciously keep up a couple of religions in the various branches of their family, so as to be available both for Catholic and Protestant emergencies, have ceased to be themselves royal, the embarrassment will be really serious.
