"NOT A GUN WAS HEARD"—NOT A FURNAL NOTE.—The 29th of June, the anniversary of the Battle of Fort Mifflin, was allowed to pass in Charleston harbor absolutely without notice. The customary salute was not fired, and but for the announcement in THE NEWS, few would have remembered that it was the anniversary of one of the most glorious victories of the revolution. Before the war Fort Mifflin always fired the annual salute commemorative of her ancient triumph.

THE ASPHALT SIDEWALKS.—The sidewalks recently laid in Meeting-street have proved to be defective in many places, and are affected by the action of the weather, the lime washing away from the tar. To remedy this and preserve the pavement from further deterioration, the Mayor has ordered them to be covered with a thin coating of tar and gravel. The laborers were engaged yesterday in performing this work, and a large portion of the sidewalk on each side of the street was tarred.

THE SAVANNAH REGATTA AND THE MAGGIE MITCHELL.—The success of the Maggie Mitchell in the late yacht race has induced Capt. Black, her owner, to enter her as one of the contestants for the proposed race at the Forest City. The Maggie Mitchell has proved her nautical qualities so frequently that the Savannah Yacht Club will have to look out for their laurels, or they will be borne off by the succie Maggie. Capt. Black will sail his little craft to Savannah, taking the inland route, and she will arrive in ample time to take her place in the race.

A TRAIN STOPPED BY CATERPILLARS.—The legend which tells of a train on the South Carolina Railroad being stopped by an army of caterpillars has found its parallel in Europe. A Paris correspondent of the Baltimore Gazette writes as follows: An extraordinary story is told of the stopping of a railway train from Paris to Vendome, by an enormous quantity of caterpillars in a migratory state crossing the railway track, and being matted upon the rails made them so slippery that the engines could not move, rendering it necessary to send for another locomotive to start up the train.

A CATWO NUBANCE.—Throughout the city there are a number of low lots and excavations which have been filled with water by the late rains, and ponds have been formed that are in some instances nearly four feet deep. If this water is not speedily pumped out it will stagnate and prove very injurious to the health of the community. The steam fire engines could soon reduce these ponds to dry land, and it is full time that they should be put to work. In the southwestern portion of the city a number of white and colored boys have been using these ponds as bathing places, much to the disgust of persons living in their vicinity.

STAMENTS TRANSPORTATION.—PREACHERS, &c. The greatest yield of peaches ever known between Aiken and Augusta will be the crop of 1868; and in no previous year have shippers enjoyed such great advantages in transportation to Northern cities as the port of Charleston offers this season. We learn that the dispatch of steamers to Baltimore, Philadelphia and New York, will be during the peach season: On Tuesdays, to Baltimore and Philadelphia, Messrs. Courtenay & Trenholm, agents; Messrs. Barwell & Co. dispatch a Wednesday steamer; Messrs. Getty & Co. a Friday steamer, and Messrs. Adger & Co. a Saturday steamer—so that the orchards can be picked over for four separate steamer days in the week. This, as we have already said, is an amount of accommodation equal to all the wants of shippers, and, we hope, will prove peculiarly advantageous to all concerned.

THE FREEMAN'S SAVINGS BANK.—By a notice from the institution, which appears in another column, it will be seen that all deposits made on or before the 30th July will be entitled to interest from the first proximo at five per cent.

ADVANTAGES OF ACCIDENT INSURANCE ILLUSTRATED.—A gentleman, while on a picnic at Mount Pleasant, a few weeks ago, fell and severely sprained his ankle, which accident totally disabled him for several weeks from attending to his business. THE LEGISLATURE—ITS PROBABLE ADJOURNMENT TO CHARLESTON.—On next Monday the General Assembly of South Carolina will convene in Columbia, in accordance with the proclamation of Governor Scott. Janney's Hall has been arranged for legislative purposes, but complaints as to its fitness are already made, and a majority of the members are already clamorous for an immediate adjournment to Charleston. Janney's upper hall might answer for the House, but there is no room suited for the Senate, and no committee rooms. The two halls in Nickerson's Hotel have been suggested, but their situation in the body of a hotel prevents their use if they were otherwise adapted for the purpose. The probabilities are that after the Governor's message has been read, a motion to adjourn to Charleston will be made and carried by a large majority. Once here, the Club House is sure, and by knocking two of the lower rooms into one, accommodations would be secured for both the Senate and House, besides a sufficient number of committee rooms. The only objection to the proposed adjournment will be made by those politicians who fear that a move to Charleston will tend to still further weaken the hold of the Republican party upon the affections of the up-country. They fear that the old proverb may prove true, and that "absence will conquer love," even the abiding attachment of the "truly loill."

THE "PANNIERS" IN PARIS.—Our lady readers may rely upon the following extracts from a Paris letter, as giving the very latest wrinkles in the world of fashion: "Upper skirts are still very generally worn in the pannier style, being caught up at the sides, puffing out at the back, while the front breadth is perfectly flat, the crinoline always commencing from the sides. For in-door dress, the double skirt forming panniers, with a muslin body completed by a small hanging vest, with or without sleeves, is very much worn. These fancy vests are made of cashmere, and trimmed with gold cord or braid, or narrow plaid flounces, and have sometimes scarf sashes. Jigs has almost entirely gone out of fashion; fretting with net-work or satin balls having taken its place. Sashes continue to be the rage, and the variety of them is endless.

The two-skirted dresses for street and country wear—the lower one with a founce, the upper one puckered up in the pannier style, caught up at the sides, puffing out at the back, whilst the front breadth is perfectly flat—have a bergere Watteau-look that is quaint, graceful, and admits of modifications in shape and color. Our elegantes are preparing their paraphernalia for the gay season at the seaside and watering resorts; but even at Biarritz and Baden-Baden the short costume will be only permitted for morning wear, and, as in the capital, not admissible for evening toilette neither on the promenade nor in the ball-room. The full dress must be made long, trailing behind, though short in front, the side breadths being much longer, and gathered to the length of the front, thus forming a kind of pannier merely by the manner in which the skirts are fashioned."
