The Elections To-Day.

General elections take place to-day in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana. As these States vote to-day so will they, in all probability, vote in November. If the telegrams which we publish to-morrow, announce decisive Democratic victories, the Democratic candidate for President of the United States will assuredly be elected. Speculation now is useless, and we confine ourselves to laying before our readers such information as will enable them to interpret and estimate properly the value of the news which will in a few hours be in their possession.

PEENNSYLVANIA.

The highest vote cast in Pennsylvania was 397,370, at the October election in 1866, when JOHN W. GARY was elected Governor over HEISTER CLYMER by a majority of 17,178. In 1867, SHARPSHOOT, Democrat, was elected Judge of the Supreme Court by 922 majority, in a total vote of 62,500 less than that cast in 1866. The vote of the State during the last seven years is as follows:
