DEATH OF A STEAMER CAPTAIN.—Captain Thomas R. Payne, about 51 years of age, a native of England, but who has resided here from boyhood, and who, as a captain of steamers and tug boats, was well known, died here on Saturday, after a protracted illness.

FARMERS' SCHOOL BUILDING IN CHARLESTON.—General Howard has succeeded, it is understood, in obtaining a release from the Secretary of the Treasury until the necessary funds shall be raised to complete the payment for the Marine Hospital at Charleston, purchased by Rev. Mr. Porter for a freedmen's school.

THE STATE AUDITOR, who has issued a circular instructing County Auditors not to furnish township selection lists of property in their respective townships. Inasmuch as the County Commissioners are allowed to, and probably will assess a tax of three mills on the dollar, he decides that no further tax can be levied, the said three mills on the dollar being the utmost tax allowed by law for all county purposes.

GENERAL O'NEIL'S LECTURE TO-NIGHT will, in all probability, be numerously attended. The theme is one upon which every Irishman delights to dilate: Ireland the Pioneer of Civilization and Christianity in Western Europe; Ireland the Home of Genius and the Patroness of Merit; Her Physical and Moral Beauties; Her Trials and Her Wrongs. These are broad subjects and will be well handled. We predict an enthusiastic gathering.

THE CINCINNATI SOUTHERN RAILROAD.—The Anderson Intelligence, in regard to the adoption of Christianity as the terminus of this railroad, says: "Within the last week assurance have been given that Louisville will at once send the system of railway to the Tennessee line in the direction of Knoxville, and that the Knoxville and Kentucky Road will connect with Louisville in eighteen or twenty months, thus affording connection with Louisville and Cincinnati." This confirms what THE NEWS has already said upon this subject.

THE SCHEDULE.—It is now definitely settled, that the shooting fest previously spoken of in THE NEWS will take place at the plaza on the 30th instant. The prizes have been divided into two classes—fifteen for the active members, and five for the passive members—twenty in all to be shot for. A committee of arrangements has been appointed on the part of the passive members, and consists of Messrs. J. Henry Hapgood, R. S. Bruns and T. Street; Messrs. J. N. Robson and George W. Williams & Co. have furnished supplies of powder, from the brands for which they are agents, respectively, in order to give the virtues of each brand a fair test.

DEATH OF A WELL KNOWN CITIZEN OF COLUMBIA.—The Phoenix announces the death on the 11th instant of Mr. Wm. R. Hunt, who was for many years employed as clerk in the office of the Secretary of State, and by his admirable business qualities so recommended himself to the Legislature of South Carolina that he was elected first to the office of Surveyor-General, and afterwards to that of Secretary of State. During the period of fifteen years in which he was engaged in the State Department, he also filled the post of Deputy Comptroller-General. Mr. Hunt had acquired in his term of service a large and varied experience. He died of a violent consumption, at the age of thirty-five.

THE RADICAL VIEW.

The Missionary Record on the Municipal Dead Lock—Cain's Advice to His Brethren—The Radical Outlook.

Daddy Cain's paper, the Missionary Record, of Saturday contains another onslaught upon the factions in Council. Surely as the good advice comes from Senator Cain, a black man and a Radical, men, Council will take his advice—Go to Cain to take his advice—Stay no longer here to vex us—Meet in Council tomorrow!

Cain's article is addressed to the City Council, and concludes as follows: All honest men are now at a loss to understand and act upon the radical view to the effect in the ranks of your body. Had you been divided into two parts, the people would have readily understood your relationships. Had there been a Democratic Branch of the Council, men could have solved this mystery. But when it is remembered that the contending parties are all Republicans—when it is remembered that you are now being kept for six months to reach the place where you are now doing so much mischief, both to the party and to every citizen, it reflects the greatest credit on you. You are now beginning to believe that you have falsified your professions and betrayed the trust reposed in you. Men, by hundreds, who formerly will now direct their blows against you, as if you were a cursed serpent. The persistency with which you have kept up this war of attrition, has led you to the name of the "Tumblers" now on the streets in a dress of silence, with one hand on their purses and the other on pistols. Your examples, in the Council chamber, has emboldened the midnight and the cut-throat to walk the streets with impunity—having the living examples of their city "strongmen." You should at once resign, and let the people choose those who will adhere to principles of equal justice. By your action, already a wall is going up from the level of the poor; already the grim monster death has entered the door of many who have been deprived of honest labor by and through your non-action for the general welfare. If, therefore, you would reserve the remainder of respect which the community have for you, resign your office, and retire to Cuba, or Central America, or to Hades—anywhere, so this city is at rest. "Let us have peace."

Another Radical view of the matter is contained in the following paragraph: The only possible line of arrangement is now clearly indicated. The Mayor declines to himself ready to make any sacrifice of personal feeling, and to give assurance of a fair distribution of patronage among his friends and his opponents alike, within the lines of the Republican party. Further than this he says that his own self respect and the deference due to the feelings of those who have stood by him will not permit him to make any such arrangement, any mutual arrangement, he insists on the withdrawal of all obnoxious legislation. The Mayor is thoroughly convinced that, he is right. He has a posterity to be considered, and will hold it. There is no basis of settlement but this for this summer.

This being the fact, the Council will proceed to distribute among the members of the party, as agreed upon on this basis, or when time brings to the Mayor a working majority. These are the simple alternatives. We believe that a settlement will be effected in a few days. If not there is a more distant alternative in an appeal to the courts or to the Legislature. But no special session will be convened for the purpose. So that this remedy is far away.

FINANCIAL.

SEA ISLAND COTTON.—A late Liverpool correspondent reports the sale in that market of one bag of Carolina sea island cotton at 57d. per pound. We understand that this superior specimen of long staple cotton was raised on Edisto Island, in this State, by J. Jenkins Mikell, Esq., so well known in this region for his skillful plantation management. It was shipped by Messrs. Willis & Chisolm, of this city, to Messrs. J. N. Beach & Co., of Liverpool, who disposed of it.

Goodwin, magistrate at Hodges Station, in place of J. Hodger, resigned. J. A. Leland, at Greenwood, in place of J. B. Tarrant. Thomas Anderson, magistrate in Fairfield County, in place of J. A. Crampson, disqualified. James E. Quantelbaum, magistrate for Orangeburg. E. W. Everson, of Richland, and C. S. Ball, of Orangeburg, notaries public. Edgar A. Nicholson, deputy surveyor for Beaufort County. The Governor has pardoned Thomas Graham, who was sentenced to be hung on the 30th of April last, but was respited for the purpose of procuring important testimony, not adduced at the trial.

Charles D. Gehrahs was convicted at the Orangeburg Court of assault and battery, with intent to kill, and fined \$500. The Governor has remitted the penalty, on the ground of violent provocation in the most infamous assault of the defendant and his family. The Governor has declined to further interfere in the case of Cyrus Coachman, convicted of the murder of Robert P. Suggs, near Florence, on the 10th of January last. He will therefore be executed on Friday, the 18th instant.

REPORTERS' CRUMBS.—Judge Orr granted two divorces, at the late term of the Greenville Court, on the petition of distressed females; in a case where the husband petitioned, the matter was reserved for further consideration.

A grain reaper has been introduced into Laurens County by Mr. Allen Dial. As a novelty it attracted a crowd.

Colonel John Cunningham has opened a law office in Laurensville.

The committee who have undertaken to arrange the preliminaries for raising the \$10,000 to be contributed by the citizens to the theatre project, will probably commence their collection tour to-day. We sincerely hope they may meet with abundant success. We must have a theatre, and this is our best chance.

The vaudeville race on the plank road, in Elizabeth-street, on Saturday afternoon, was highly exciting and full of humor. Mr. Chapin was the winner of the "hoda water-and cakes." There was river immersion by the Rev. J. Logara, at the foot of Tradd-street, yesterday. Eleven males and thirty-five females, all colored, were baptised.

A child accidentally fell into the pond at the foot of Broad-street, on Friday last, and was rescued from drowning by a passer by.

There is a great scarcity (says an observing gentleman) of ants this season and a superabundance of flies. What does this mean? The prospect of a meeting of Council is now less favorable than a few days ago.

Deer are very numerous now in the suburbs. Several fine runs have been made lately. There has been no little shaking of official bones in the past few days in anticipation of the garrote which report says Council will soon apply.

The commencement exercises of the Baker Theological Institute, colored, takes place at the Centenary M. E. Church this evening at eight o'clock.

Everybody is on the qui vive for the yacht race which is proposed for the 28th instant. In the hands of an energetic committee we are satisfied that the contest might be made a great success.
