THE LAST RAILROAD HORROR.

A Train of Cars Precipitated Thirty Feet and Consumed by Fire—Twenty-five Persons Killed, Wounded and Missing—Loss Estimated at \$500,000—Thrilling Details.

The dreadful accident which befell a passenger train on the Clarksville division of the Memphis and Louisville Railroad occurred at a point eight miles south of Clarksville, Tenn., at one o'clock in the morning of Wednesday, the 28th. Four persons were killed outright and forty or fifty wounded, more or less seriously. The Courier-Journal furnishes the following details:
