NEW YORK RICE MARKET. The Journal of Commerce, of Saturday, the 19th instant, says: In domestic trade there is rather more doing, but at lower prices. The receipts at the southern ports are increasing, and as the demand is limited, holders are offering to make concessions. We notice sales of 250 tons, including 150 casks for export, at 5 1/2c for common and average. We quote inferior at 5 1/4c to 5 1/2c. In Kangaroo there has been quite a movement of 1,500 bags, which have been sold on private terms. Prices are now nominal to quote.

MURRAY, FERRIS & CO.'S NAVAL STORES CIRCULAR. NEW YORK, March 12.—SPRINGS TURPENTINE.—There were further transactions this week for export, but the local demand is quite moderate. The sales are 1775 bbls, at 48c 1/2c merchant and shipping, and 47 casks. As the stock is now reduced to 500 bbls, and nearly all in the hands of two parties, we regard a material advance during the next thirty days as not improbable in view of the light receipts here and in Wilmington. The market closes strong at 45c 1/2c merchant. Receipts 850 bbls. Exports 1004 bbls.

EASTON & CO.'S COTTON REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING MARCH 15, 1870. NEW YORK, March 16.—THE MARKET.—In our last report the market closed quiet at 21 1/2c for middling uplands. Saturday the market was firm, and prices advanced to 22c. Middlings 21 1/2c. Monday the offerings were small and the market steady, until after the dispatch from New Orleans came to hand advising small receipts. An active demand sprang up for future contracts at 2 1/2c advance over prices paid early in the day; sales 2994 bales at 21 1/2c. Tuesday the market was firmer, the foreign advices were favorable, and exporters bought freely; sales 4622 bales, Middlings 21 1/2c. Wednesday the demand was moderate, the stock offering presented a buoyant front; sales 2000 bales, Middlings 21 1/2c. Thursday the market was very strong, closing at 22 1/2c; sales 2200 bales. Friday the market was quiet, and prices were easier; sales 1400 bales, Middlings 21 1/2c. During the week we have had an excited and agitating market, caused by the covering of short contracts. The advance on spot cotton is 2c since last Friday, the 11th, and in contracts for future delivery the rise was greater. This change has been brought about by the heavy falling out in receipts, which took the trade by surprise. The offering stock continues light, and there appears to be no more sales at 20 1/2c than there were at 21 1/2c. Of the total stock in the ports, we suppose there are 175,000 bales on shipboard, and 200,000 bales afloat from America for Liverpool may be expected to arrive in the next seven weeks, during which time the stock will gradually increase.

Shipping. WANTED 500 BALES TO COMPLETE CARGO, FOR LIVERPOOL. The number of steamers going out by the Suez Canal rapidly increases, and it seems as though a greater proportion of the crop will come by that route than was recently expected, and we believe the present deficiency of Surat cotton afloat will be quite compensated from that source.
