THE SEWING MACHINE CASE.—In this case of attachment of money still due, and secured by notes, the Justice of the Peace decided that the defendant could not protect the property under the homestead law, as it had never been paid for. Several witnesses having also testified that the contract gave the alternative to pay for or return the machine, the Justice gave judgment for the plaintiff for \$46, or in case this should not be paid, for the machine itself. The machine is supposed to be damaged beyond the amount of the cash portion, and hence the sentence of all parties on this subject.

ROBBERY OF A STEAMSHIP.—For some time past different articles have been missed, from time to time, from the cabin of the steamship Georgia, for the disappearance of which no one could be held responsible. A heavier loss than usual, which occurred a few days ago, caused the matter to be referred to the captain of the police, and, under the investigation of Private Nipson appointed by him for that purpose, James Ridge was arrested yesterday morning for the robbery. A fine coat and pair of pants, which were among the articles stolen, were recovered from a shop on King street, where the prisoner had sold them for the sum of \$5. Ridge is turned over to a trial justice, before whom his examination will take place on Monday.

STRAP GAME, OR NOW YOU SEE IT AND NOW YOU DON'T.—A few days ago a young man from the country came down to the city to purchase his winter goods, and having in his possession a handsome double-cased gold watch, on Thursday evening, while knocking around, he fell in with James McQueen and an attendant companion, who, in the technical language of the officers, are denominated "confidential fellows." These men were engaged in the simple little amusement known as the "strap game." By the connivance of the "confidential fellows" the "young man from the country" won at first, but in a short time he was cleaned out. A few more baits were thrown out, and in a few moments the watch was stolen and speedily followed his greenbacks into the pockets of the strap-men. He now began to see through it in earnest, and reported the whole affair to Captain Hendricks. The case was placed in the hands of Privates Nipson, Simmons and Banoh, who yesterday afternoon recovered the watch from a house in Spring street, where it had been hidden, and then arrested McQueen and his companion. They are committed to await their examination before a trial justice.

CLUBS AND STAIRS.—Wilson Weston, John Sheppard, Chas. W. and Wm. Jones, the four soldiers who were engaged in the row on Thursday morning in Elliott street, were brought before the Mayor, the two former being charged with fighting and resisting the police, and the two latter charges with attempting to rescue their comrades. After a hearing, they were sentenced each to pay a fine of \$10 or to go to the House of Correction for twenty days.

Mary Parker, one of the disreputable denizens of Elliott street, arrested for trespassing upon the premises of Mr. James Hebron in Calhoun street, on Thursday night, and also for vagrancy, was sent, after a hearing, to the House of Correction for thirty days.

Abraham Brown was tried for allowing a dangerous dog to run at large and bite A. Chisolm. The facts were not substantiated, and there being considerable doubt whether or not he was really bitten, the Mayor discharged the prisoner.

Mr. Powers, the scavenger, was ordered to repair the damages to the gate of the upper ward stationhouse, which he had broken the night before with his cart.

One votary of Bacchus, who was navigating Archdale street with much difficulty, and evidently from his loud speaking imagined himself as holding the floor in the National Bar Garden, was taken to the Guardhouse and discharged by the Mayor next morning on the plea of the "drat offence."

UNITED STATES COURT.—The District Court was opened at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, his Honor Judge Bryan presiding.

The appointment of F. E. Schroder as assignee was approved by the Judge.

In re Jno. C. Dove, bankrupt. Ordered that Thos. C. Cox, sheriff of Darlington, be enjoined from levying on or interfering with the property of the bankrupt, or from collecting any debts due him at the time of filing his petition in bankruptcy.

United States vs. George Curtis, Jas. Singleton and Fenwick Robinson, for neglect of duty as managers of election. The jury brought in a verdict of not guilty, and on motion the prisoners, Singleton and Curtis, were discharged.

United States vs. Cesar Deas, Archibald Jackson and Israel Crawford, for not swearing voters. Not guilty.

The grand jury then returned into court and made the following presentment:

PRESENTMENT OF THE GRAND JURY OF THE UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURT, HOLDEN AT CHARLESTON, S. C., FOR THE EASTERN DISTRICT OF SOUTH CAROLINA.

We, the grand jury of the above court, at the conclusion of our labors, respectfully present: That in the discharge of our official duties we have the district greatly benefited by reason of the recent frauds upon the ballot box in the late elections. There was an evident intention in many instances to set aside by fraud and force the election of the qualified electors. This deplorable state of things was produced by a widespread ignorance and unscrupulous manipulation of the masses by printing and circulating sheets. The numerous convictions which followed, it is hoped, will operate as a salutary lesson, not only upon the guilty parties themselves, but upon the masses generally, and produce a more wholesome regard to the requirements of law.

In accordance with our duties and the instructions of the court, we visited the Charleston Jail, and were much pleased to find the prisoners generally attending school. This is a step in the right direction, and we trust will result in a due to the widespread ignorance, to which allusion has already been made. We found the rooms in the jail in a cleanly condition, but some of the prisoners were without sufficient bedding. The severity of the winter suggests the fact that such a matter requires attention. We hope that the next grand jury will find the same offence repeated. This defect may have caused the attempted emence, in which several prisoners were injured.

The building now used as the United States court-house, we respectfully suggest that it be inspected by competent parties as to its safety, and that their views should be carried into effect, as we believe it would be a saving to the United States Government.

The old building which strangers and disgraces the east-end of Broad street, formerly used by the United States as a post-office, which was mentioned in the presentment of the last grand jury, remains in an old state, and its safety, safety and inconvenience of the commercial community.

The building known as the Citadel, which is, and has been occupied by United States troops, in a recent conflagration suffered to the extent of all the interior portion of its western wing. It is respectfully suggested, might be utilized by being converted into offices for the use of the United States Government.

On the conclusion of the court for the kind assistance afforded us in the instructions, commendations and urbanity of the Hon. George S. Bryan.
