

AN ASTOUNDING FRAUD. THE RUMORED OVER-ISSUES OF STATE BONDS.

There are rumors on the street that under every act authorizing the issue of State bonds there has been an over-issue. Rumor states that under the act funding the bills of the Bank of the State there was an over-issue of half a million. It is rumored that under the act of 1868 for the relief of the treasury, there were duplicate issues, making an amount double that anticipated by the people.

It is asserted that parties here are preparing affidavits looking to suits against the persons implicated. The stockholders of the Blue Ridge Railroad met again to-day, and the reports of the officers were rendered. They entered into a detailed account of the condition of the road, especially of its financial embarrassments.
