ADVANCE IN COTTON.—It seems to be generally believed that the recent startling advance in the price of cotton will not only be sustained, but be still further improved. The now universally conceded small amount of land cultivated in cotton, the recent disastrous casualties resulting in the burning of immense quantities of the "royal of staples," re-opening and resumption of labor at most of the foreign and domestic cotton mills—all these considerations combine to enhance the price, and will, doubtless, not cease to operate for years to come. At all events, and in any reasonable view of the case, our planters may now go to work at their preliminary arrangements for planting heavy crops for the next year, well assured that industry and enterprise will indubitably be rewarded with large returns.—*Savannah Herald.*

Bishop Wilmer, of Alabama, has replied to the order of Gen. Wood closing the Episcopal Churches in that State, refusing to recognize the right of any civil or military officer to dictate to him in the performance of his duty in the Church of God. But whilst he has neither the wish nor the power to resist military force, he enters his solemn protest against the interference expressed in the order issued by General Wood. The latter responded by stating that if the order was not obeyed, he would certainly use military force in closing the churches.
