Washington, November 7.—It is understood that the Treasury Department favors the extension of National Bank facilities in the South, commensurate with its wants for banking purposes.

The President endorses the statement of Governor Perry, of South Carolina, concerning his (the President's) views as to the admission of Southern Representatives to Congress. The President holds that the mass of them can take part in the organization of the House. I need not repeat the usual arguments in this behalf, which he fully agrees to.

A proclamation may shortly be expected from the President, declaring the insurrection or rebellion in the South is at an end.

The visit of Governor Parsons, of Alabama, here is understood to have been mainly for the pardon of persons of large means, to the end that capital might be untied and used for recenstructing railroads and for other purposes of business in a large way in the South. He has gone North to further the said objects.

The medical faculty here are to have a meeting on Wednesday week, for the purpose of comparting notes or expressing views upon the subject of cholera.

General Longstreet has taken private lodgings here. Hon. John Covode, Albert Pike and Jesse D. Bright are here.

The President has approved the sentence passed upon Henry Wirz, "to be hanged by the neck till he be dead," and ordered it to be carried into execution on Friday next, the 10th day of November, between the hours of 6 o'clock A. M., and 12 o'clock noon. The Washington Star says:

The sentence of Wirz was read to him on Monday afternoon by General Augur, commanding this department, who proceeded to the prisoner's room, accompanied by Captain Russell, provost marshal, and Captain George R. Walbridge, commandant of the prison. General Auger, in a few words, at once informed the prisoner of the nature of his unpleasant errand, and proceeded to read the sentence.

The prisoner listened to the reading with considerable composure, apparently having prepared himself for it, and at the conclusion remarked, "Well, I suppose it must be done." In a moment or two he looked across the passage in the direction of Gen. Briscoe's cell, which is opposite the one occupied by him, and called ont to h

despatch from the United States Consul at Kingston, Jamaica, under date of October 10, in which he alludes to the serious insurrection of the negro population on that island. There are on the island about 400,000 inhabitants, of which only 10,000 are whites, about 75,000 mulattoes, and 325,000 blacks. The Consul expresses the belief that the present outbreak has been long contemplated, and is intended to be a war of extermination against the whites, and the great disparity of numbers gives the former a great advantage. They have, too, chosen a time when there are but few English troops on the island—about 600—and there happens, also, to be but one small English war steamer there. The Consul suggests that an American war steamer be despatched to that port.

The impression is that Jeff. Davis will be released, with the understanding that he will go to Europe and not return; or, in other words, to be expatriated.
