PROSPECT OF ANOTHER COLLISION OF AUTHORITY.—A few days since the Freedmen's Court set about the good work of closing up the negro dance houses which have been opened by a low class of white men in the negro "settlement" just outside the corporate limits of the city, and which were complained of by the citizens as intolerable nuisances. One of these was run by Dan, Dunnegan & Co., on Church street, and report said it was frequented by gangs of lawless, drunken negroes, to the great scandal of the neighborhood, "and the peace and dignity of the State." Dunnegan was arrested, taken before the Freedmen's Court and fined \$50. Dunnegan subsequently went before the grand jury of the United States District Court and lodged "an information," and that body returned an indictment against John Lawrence, Judge of the Freedmen's Court, and his clerk, J. B. Coon, for "extorting money under cover of their office." A warrant was served upon them, but no bail was given, and we learn that Judge Lawrence has been ordered by the Freedmen's Bureau not to obey the warrant, as he was in the discharge of his duty.—*Nashville Union.*

DISQUIETUDE IN CANADA.—The *New York Herald* gives the following as a summary of news from that province:

The French inhabitants of Canada are adding to the disquietude which the Fenian excitement has recently inflicted on the Canadian Government. The French organs and the members of the French association known as the Sons of Liberty, have become very bold in their denunciations of British domination and British confederation schemes. The French Canadians would rather see the province annexed to the United States than merged into a colonial union, whereby their influence and their nationality would be completely overthrown and neutralized. Already the French newspapers in Montreal have received a semi-official warning in reference to the alleged imprudence of their course. Meantime the members of the government, backed by the British ministry, are pushing their confederation programme, but so far apparently with no positive assurance of success.
