

News Items.

New York, April 9.—The steamship Great Eastern, which has been expected here for several days, arrived this morning. She leaves for Brest on the 18th.

The steamship Relief will shortly load with provisions for the sufferers South. August Belmont has consented to allow his private gallery of paintings to be thrown open to the public five days, for the benefit of the Ladies' Southern Relief Association. This evening, Mr. and Mrs. George Vandenhoff give a volunteer reading, in Steinway Hall, in aid of the Southern Relief Commission.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—In the Southern relief basket, at Dr. Gillette's Church, was found a dollar bill, in which was wrapped a ladies' diamond ring.

Internal revenue receipts to-day over \$700,000.

The Russian treaty was ratified to-day, with two or three dissenting votes.

The President has pardoned Z. B. Vance, lately Governor of North Carolina, on the recommendation of twelve Senators and twenty-eight Representatives.

Louis Schade, who defended Wirz, has addressed a letter to the American people, alleging Wirz's innocence.

Agricultural Commissioner Newton has appointed Hon. Theodore Peters, of Maryland, lately President of the New York Agricultural Society, agent for the distribution of seeds in the South, to perfect Southern agricultural correspondence and to co-operate in the re-organization and improvement of Southern agriculture.

The Austrian Minister, on the 5th, announced to Mr. Seward that he was instructed to ask the good offices of the United States Government in sponsoring safe treatment of Maximilian and his followers, in case he fell into the hands of the Liberals at Queretaro. On the 6th, Mr. Seward replied, that he had telegraphed to Minister Campbell to send a swift messenger to Juarez, conveying the request that all possible leniency be extended towards the expected prisoners, and also that he had placed a copy of his instructions in the hands of Minister Romero, who had promised to inform Juarez of the wishes of the United States Government.

On the same day, Minister Campbell replied that he had forwarded the messenger.

A fire occurred in Petralia, C. W., on Sunday, in which two girls perished.

Augusta, April 9.—The following despatch was received by the Chronicle and Sentinel to-day, from Governor Jenkins:

MOBILE, April 9.—The steamboat Benefit, with 200 bales of cotton on board, was burned, on the 7th, at Sizmore's wood-yard, on the Alabama River.

A train on the Mobile and Great Northern Railroad was thrown from an embankment, near Carpenter's Station, this morning, and the baggage-master killed and three persons injured.

EASTON, Pa., April 9.—Market street, from the Court House to the Wilkesbarre Bridge, was burnt to-day.

PARIS, April 9.—The Secretary of Foreign Affairs made a conciliatory speech, which greatly lessens the panic.

LONDON, April 9.—The Liberals, in the House, split on the reform bill. The Derby Ministry is regarded safe.
