Cable Despatches. LONDON, December 10.—It is said the Roman Conference has been defeated by Rother's speech, which indicates that the French Government has prejudged the whole case.

News Items. CHARLESTON, December 10.—Arrived—steamers Manhattan and Saragossa, New York; Falcon, Baltimore; schooner Laura Bridgeman, Boston. Sailed—ship Mary Ogden, Liverpool; schooner L. B. Wishard.

WASHINGTON, December 10.—Edward William Johnston, a veteran editor and brother of Gen. Joseph E. Johnston, is dead.

Internal revenue receipts to-day \$576,000. The bill introduced yesterday by Windom, to amend the Act for the government of the rebel States, and to facilitate restoration, amends section 5 of the Act of March 2, 1867, so as to provide that if, according to the rules in each State, the Constitution shall be ratified by a majority of the votes of the registered electors, qualified as specified in the bill, the President of the Constitutional Convention shall forward a copy of the same, duly certified, to the President of the United States; and it shall by him be laid before Congress.

Nathaniel Pierce (Democrat) has been elected Mayor of Newburyport, Massachusetts.

ATLANTA, December 10.—The Convention assembled at noon. Foster Blodgett took the chair, and read a long address, evidently prepared with the expectation of his being chosen President. The Convention then proceeded to the election of a President, and J. R. Parrott, of Bartow, was elected—which is regarded as a triumph by the more conservative wing. Parrott, in an address, said, above all things, the Convention should do nothing to throw additional obstacles in the path of the Republican party, or put a weapon in the hands of their enemies. The address was partizan, but not ultra.

6 P. M.—Shebley, of Florida, a Loyal Leaguer, was elected Secretary. Pending the election of President, an outside negro attempted to vote in place of an absent member, but was discovered, brought to the bar, and put out as an intruder. Adjourned till 10 o'clock to-morrow.

Congressional. WASHINGTON, December 10.—In the Senate, a memorial was presented from the New York Chamber of Commerce, relative to the resumption of specie payment, which was referred to the Committee on Finance. The President was called on for the correspondence relative to the recognition of belligerent rights by Great Britain to the Confederacy.

Mr. Wilson introduced his bill, removing political disabilities from 248 Alabamians. Mr. Doolittle gave notification of an amendment to the Reconstruction Acts, providing that all persons offering to vote, on adoption of Constitutions, who do not possess the qualifications required by the States prior to the rebellion, shall possess one of three qualifications—first, service in the army of the United States at least one year; second, ability to read and understand the nature of an oath; or, third, to possess \$250 freehold, in his own or wife's right. The above was offered as an amendment to Wilson's bill, making a majority of voters, instead of a majority of those registered, necessary to carry the Constitution. Wilson said he did not know that it would be necessary to pass his bill. Davis said this was a white man's Government, and ever would be; the freemen of this country would never consent to have a President forced on them by negro electoral votes. He wanted this issue to come quickly, and invited Wilson to press on with his bill. Stewart said negro suffrage would not be the issue next fall, and proceeded to defend the Reconstruction Acts. Doolittle's amendment was referred to the Judiciary Committee. Adjourned.

In the House, the Speaker announced that the Reconstruction Committee—resuscitated by yesterday's action—would consist of Stevens, Boutwell, Bingham, Farnsworth, Hulburd, Bramhall, Payne, Brooks and Beck—but two Democrats. Stevens' confederation bill of last session came up, and after several speeches in opposition, the matter was postponed to the 21st January. A concurrent resolution was adopted, to adjourn from the 20th instant to the 6th January. Adjourned.
